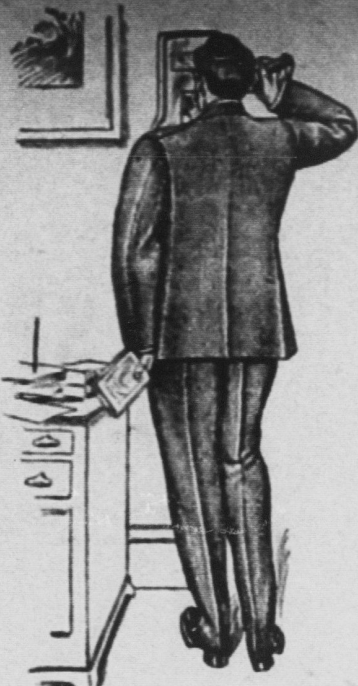

**MONTHLY MEETING
BOROUGH COUNCIL**

City Fathers Disposed of Many Important Matters Last Night, Including the Payment of Sidewalk Rebates Amounting to Nearly \$300

The usual monthly accumulation of borough business was considered by the city fathers at a meeting held in the town hall last night. The fire department, the board of health and the police department came in for a fair share of attention and many questions pertaining to the same were disposed of, while others were left in the hands of committees for future consideration. Sawtelle, Eason, West, Samuels, Case, Pritchard, Burns, Ademy and Hawes answered to the roll call, and directly after the opening of the session for business Councilman Haverly's name was added to the list of those present.

J. C. Wood of West Sayre appeared before the council on behalf of the Howard Elmer hose company and requested that the borough furnish half the coal for heating the company's rooms. Mr. Wood also asked the council to do something regarding the fire alarm system. He stated that at the last fire it was from fifteen to twenty minutes before the central telephone station could be reached and as a result the company did not get to the fire. Mr. Wood's proposition regarding the furnishing of coal was referred to a committee and the latter were empowered to take any action which conditions seemed to warrant. No action was taken on the fire alarm matter.

Councilman West stated that the sewer committee was unable to make a report as the members were waiting for estimates from the engineers.

The matter of placing a light at the corner of Hospital place was brought to the attention of the council by President Sawtelle, who stated that the locality mentioned was very dark and that the borough should take action. After some discussion the light committee was authorized to place a gas lamp at the corner named.

Upon the recommendation of the police committee Hugh Dixon was appointed a special police. An application from Angelo Masetto, an Italian from the east side, who is anxious to become "one of the finest" was referred to the committee, the application not being in regular form. Following the disposition of the application President Sawtelle stated that while he did not wish to criticize the police committee that he believed that the borough had enough special police to meet the requirements.

The matter of assisting the Wilbur hook and ladder company in caring for their team was discussed to some extent. It was the sense of the council that the borough should either own the team or else be liberal in helping the company provide for it. A committee was instructed to look into the matter and report at a future meeting.

The council ordered a side walk laid on Miller street in front of two vacant lots, one of which adjoins property belonging to Mr. Geiss. A walk was also ordered laid on Wilbur avenue across Oneida street.

It was reported that there is no lamp at the corner of Maple and Miller streets and that the locality was dark. The council took no action.

The board of health asked for and was granted an appropriation of \$200 to meet current expenses.

An ordinance was passed which grants the Sayre Brewing Company, Ltd., the right to lay a switch track from the Lehigh Valley tracks to the brewery.

The secretary was instructed to draw an order for \$2,000 to meet an overdraft at the National Bank of Sayre amounting to \$1,200 and to pay other expenses.

**UNABLE TO LOCATE
BECKMAN'S FRIENDS**

Dead Man's Remains Still Unclaimed by Relatives and Will Probably be Buried Tomorrow

The remains of Charles A. Beckman, whose death occurred at the hospital on Saturday night, are still lying at J. W. Grumme's undertaking rooms unclaimed by relatives. All day yesterday the local authorities endeavored to get in communication with Beckman's friends. Telegrams were sent to Olean where it is said he had sisters living, but answers were received stating that the parties for whom the messages were intended could not be found. Further efforts will be made but if the authorities are unsuccessful in finding the friends of the deceased the latter's remains will be buried tomorrow at the expense of the county.

Previous to his death Beckman told the hospital authorities that he was 40 years old and of German-Irish descent. He claimed to have been a Catholic and asked for the services of a priest of that faith. He also told of his having sisters at Olean, but as it has been impossible to get in communication with them the hospital authorities are inclined to doubt this statement.

**THIEVES LOOTED
LEHIGH WRECKAGE**

Carried Away Quantity of Merchandise Which Is Recovered by Special Officers

Previous to the arrival of the wrecking crew at the Falls on the night of the wreck near that place, thieves looted the box cars which were piled up along side the tracks. Nearly all of the wrecked cars contained merchandise and a large amount of it was carried away. The loot consisted of suits, overcoats, women's skirts and shoulder capes and also a quantity of canned goods. Yesterday Special Officer Doty, of the Lehigh Detective force went to Falls and conducted an investigation with the result that he ascertained where the greater part of the merchandise had gone to. Several houses in the vicinity of the Falls were searched and the property was recovered. No arrests will follow as the officials of the company appear to be satisfied with having regained possession of the goods. It is said that some of the merchandise was found concealed in the homes of people who had always been considered above reproach, and that they carried it away believing that it was common plunder and that they were not committing a crime.

**LITTLE INTEREST IN
TODAY'S ELECTION**

Light Vote Is Being Cast and Indications Are That Election Clerks Will Be Compelled to Count Many Split Ballots

There is every indication that an exceedingly light vote will be polled in Sayre today. A visit to the various polling places in the four wards revealed the fact that at noontime considerably less than one-third of the normal ballots had been cast. In Sayre there appears but little interest in today's election. So far as could be seen on the surface the election officers will have mostly split ballots to count after the polls close this evening.

**BOARD OF HEALTH
GETS APPROPRIATION**

Differences Between That Body and the Borough Council Were Amicably Adjusted at Meeting Last Night

At the regular October meeting of the borough council the board of health asked for an appropriation of \$200 to meet expenses but the application was laid on the table after considerable discussion during which councilman Burns took the board to task, alleging that when he and his family were quarantined on account of diphtheria that the health officer had been inattentive. Mr. Burns also insisted that the board should be required to make an itemized report of its receipts and disbursements to the council once a month. The suggestion of the councilman created considerable discussion at the time and the members of the board of health took exceptions. Last night the matter came up again when the board repeated the request for an appropriation. Dr. Klein, Elmer Gregory and attorney C. C. Yocum appeared in the interests of the board. Dr. Klein stated that \$120 of the \$200 asked for was to defray expenses virtually contracted by the council. He also asked councilman Burns a number of questions regarding the manner in which he and his family were cared for at the time they were quarantined. Mr. Burns replied by stating that he was under quarantine for a period of nine days, during which time he received only three visits from the health officer. Dr. Klein assured the councilman that it was the intention of the board to treat all quarantine cases alike, but as the health officer was not there to defend himself he (Dr. Klein) was in no position to discuss the merits of the councilman's position.

Referring to the suggestion that the board be required to report to the council once a month, C. C. Yocum, attorney for the borough, stated that under the ordinance now in force, the board was compelled to report only once a year, and that if the rule were changed it would be necessary to prepare and introduce an amendment to the present ordinance.

Elmer Gregory, a member of the health board, characterized the proposition to compel the board to report every month as an insult and declared that he was ready to tender his resignation at any time. He declared that the members of the board worked without pay and that they were doing the best they could. The matter was finally adjusted by the council granting the appropriation for \$200, as requested by the board, thus adjusting the question in an amicable manner.

**CONDITIONS AT THE
NEW LEHIGH SHOPS**

As Reported to the October Issue of the "Machinists' Monthly Journal."

The following communication relative to conditions at the Sayre Lehigh Valley shops was printed in the October number of the "Machinists' Monthly Journal." It is printed under the caption "Lehigh Valley Conditions" and signed "Reporter."

Sayre, Pa., Oct. 17.
Allow me to state to our members the conditions of trade in Sayre, Pa. This is a busy little hamlet, with as fine a locomotive shop as anywhere in the country. There seems to be a big demand for mechanics, but as a rule piece-work prevails, and it is hard to get good men to work here. I wish to save the members of our craft the trouble of coming here until better conditions prevail. The shops are full of handy men and two machine men. The large majority of the men prefer piece-work, as they make a few cents more per day by hard work. The company is against a large number of our members and ex-Lehigh employees are turned down every day simply because they are old and have been employed in the company's shops at Buffalo, N. Y.; Sayre, Pa.; Wilkesbarre, or Easton, Pa. The company has no use for good card men, but prefer laborers and handy men. So keep away from Sayre; it is no place for first-class mechanics. The company raised the wages 1 cent per hour for day work, making \$2.60 for a day's pay, and then introduced piece-work and the men jump at it like flies after sugar. As long as piece-work is in the shop, so long will the men be made slaves of. If fair wages were paid for day work they could have the best machinists in the country here in Sayre, but they would all be card men then. Organized labor is in poor condition here. Ex-members and handy men run the trade.

VALLEY FIREMAN INJURED

Fearing that a collision was inevitable, Steven Hazen, a Lehigh Valley fireman, jumped from his engine yesterday afternoon, and in falling sustained a painful injury to his left forearm. The air hose on Hazen's train broke and it looked as if a serious mixup would follow and he leaped from the cab of the engine to the ground. Dr. Haines found that the bones in the left wrist had been dislocated and that the muscles in the forearm were terribly strained. Hazen will be off duty for some time. The accident he feared was averted.

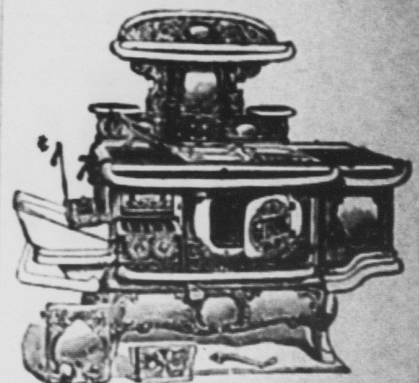
