Cremation in Europe.
Body burning gains favor slowly. Statistics of the French Society for the Encouragement of Cremation show that there are now 90 crematories in France and America, and in these 125,000 bodies have been incinerated. Germany has also crematories, in which 1,231 bodies were burned in 1904, a gain of 300 over the previous year. South America is becoming interested, and Buenos Ayres reports 370 cremations for last year.

The President's Cousin.
Comparatively few people are aware that President Roosevelt's cousin, the late Hilborne L. Roosevelt, was an inventor. But he made a fortune out of one of the appliances attached to the telephone, and he was one of the first investors to perfect several of the electric contrivances now used almost universally in connection with pipe organs. He built the huge organ which was one of the main features of the Philadelphia Centennial.

JOLT RESTORES LIFE OF SUPPOSED CORPSE.

Coffin Thrown from Hearse in Runaway, He Is Resuscitated and Drives Back to Town.

Lesueur, Minn. — The little village of Bleakwood, in this county, was the scene of a strange occurrence the other day.

There lived in the town for a number of years Peter Porter, a public charge, who lately became ill and died. The funeral day was set and attended by a number of the charitable and humanely disposed people of the town, who did not think that even a pauper should journey to the grave unattended. The man had fallen into a coma several

days before he was pronounced dead by the city physician, a young man just out of college.

When the perfunctory mourners viewed the corpse after the short service all were agreed that the deceased looked natural indeed. The plain but decent casket was placed in the hearse and the rather short funeral train moved off on its way to the cemetery, half a mile distant.

They had gone but a little way, however, when an automobile passed at great speed and so frightened the horses that they threw the driver from his seat. Then the animal ran up the road in the direction of the cemetery, distancing all pursuers and leaving the funeral train far behind.

Before reaching the cemetery, however, the horses turned into Henlet road, to the left, and soon made several other turns so that the persons in pursuit did not know which way to go, and all returned.

Half an hour later the horses, still drawing the hearse, were seen coming over the hill north of the town. To the unbounded amazement of all, as the equipage approached, it was discovered that Porter was not dead, but had been in a trance. He had recovered and was driving the hearse back home.

The vehicle had tipped over two miles from town and the shock resuscitated Porter, who, instantly comprehending the situation had called to some men near by to help him right the hearse. Then, mounting the seat, he drove back to town.

The funeral was, of course, postponed and Porter put back on the town again. The young city physician feels much embarrassed at his mistake.
