ARRESTED IN COURT.

A. V. D. Reid Held For Eignary, Accused by Brother-in-law. WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., Nov. 11.—Albert V. Deane Reid, who is endeavoring to secure the release of his bride from Bloomingdale asylum, to which she was taken the evening following her marriage by her brothers, was arrested at the close of the habeas corpus proceedings hearing here on a bench warrant issued by Recorder Goff of New York city.

Testimony was given at the hearing yesterday by Victor Delano, Mrs. Reid's brother, who told of various eccentric acts of his sister. Mrs. Victor Delano testified to the same effect. Dr. Samuel D. Lyon of the Bloomingdale asylum testified that Mrs. Reid was deficient in moral sense and mentally, but that she had greatly improved while in the asylum and was not actually insane.

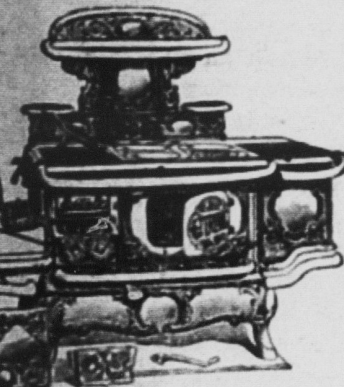
