MAN'S TORSO FOUND.

Cleveland Has a Mystery Like Bos ton Suit Case Tragedy.

CLEVELAND, O., Nov. 13 .- On one of the city dumps here some children discovered a human torso, including he thorax and shoulders, but devok of head, arms and legs.

The identity of the person is shroud ed in mystery. There was not a shred of clothing attached to the torso. It was turned over to the police and removed to the morgue. The most striking discovery was a bullet wound in the right side, which the coroner

thinks caused death. The post mortem held by Coroner Slegelstein showed that the body was that of a murdered man. It also de veloped that the body had been embalmed. The theory that the body had been cut up in a medical school and then discarded, thence being hauled to the "dump," was scouted by the core-

The body showed curious marks of mutilation, in that the head and arms had evidently been pulled off or cut rudely. The coroner holds that it is the portion of the body of a man. His weight was probably 140 pounds, but it was not possible to tell his age.
