She has been keeping house for Randall Hotel of Erie street for some time. Hotel appeared and agreed to take care of the woman and she was released.

**DECIDED TO LIVE.**

H. M. Allen Confessed Shortage in Accounts—Poison Failed to Work.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 13.—Henry M. Allen, an employee of the government printing office at Washington, who sent his wife a letter in which he said he intended committing suicide and that his body would be found at a certain spot in the Chelton hills, north of Philadelphia, has surrendered himself to the police here.

He told the authorities that after making one attempt to die he had reconsidered the matter of life and death and had decided to live, though he knew he would be a disgrace to his family. Allen announced to the police that he was short \$2,200 in his accounts of the Printers' Beneficial association, which is composed of government printers and of which he is treasurer.

The prisoner said that from Washington he went direct to Abington, Pa. There he purchased laudanum and went to the spot designated in his letter, drank the poison and lay down to die. The poison did not produce the results he desired, and after a long, heavy sleep he awoke. After that, he said, he decided to live. He walked to this city, a distance of fifteen miles, and after wandering through streets nearly twenty-four hours, during which time he suffered mental and physical torture, he decided to surrender himself to the police. He was given a hearing before a United States commissioner today.

**MAN'S TORSO FOUND.**

Cleveland Has a Mystery Like Boston Salt Case Tragedy.

CLEVELAND, O., Nov. 13.—On one of the city dumps here some children discovered a human torso, including the thorax and shoulders, but devoid of head, arms and legs.

The identity of the person is shrouded in mystery. There was not a shred of clothing attached to the torso. It was turned over to the police and removed to the morgue. The most striking discovery was a bullet wound in the right side, which the coroner thinks caused death.

The post mortem held by Coroner Siegelstein showed that the body was that of a murdered man. It also developed that the body had been emaciated. The theory that the body had been cut up in a medical school and then discarded, thence being hauled to the "dump," was scouted by the coroner.

The body showed curious marks of mutilation. In that the head and arms had evidently been pulled off or cut rudely. The coroner holds that it is the portion of the body of a man. His weight was probably 140 pounds, but it was not possible to tell his age.

**Many Americans Get Prizes.**

LIEGE, Belgium, Nov. 13.—Many Americans have secured high awards at the international exposition, which has just been brought to a successful close. John S. Sargent, the artist, secured a gold medal of honor; W. MacEwan, Carl Marr and Eugene Vall first medals for paintings and P. W. Bartlett a first medal for sculpture. American manufacturers receive 200 gold, silver and bronze medals as well as diplomas; Miss Helen Gould a grand prize, the American Institute for Social Service a grand prize, the Philadelphia museum, the Young Women's Christian association and the People's institute each a diploma of honor.

**Five Candidates to Run at Boston.**

BOSTON, Nov. 13.—With two Democratic candidates and three Republican aspirants seeking their party nominations for mayor, the most heated municipal campaign held in this section in many years is now fairly under way. The Democratic candidates for the nomination are Edward J. Donovan, the present city clerk, and former Congressman John F. Fitzgerald. The Republicans seeking the nomination of their party are Louis A. Frothingham, speaker of the state house of representatives; State Senator Edward C. Lender and former Municipal Court Judge Henry S. Dewey.

**A Kiss Album Now.**

LONDON, Nov. 13.—A west end woman has an album in which kisses of friends are registered. The album is provided with a pad of soluble carmine tinted substance on which the lips are pressed. Then the kiss is imprinted in a space provided on a page on which the kisser may add his or her autograph. The inventor says there is a lot of character in kisses. No two are alike. Some are big and smugly and others are little and pecky.
