### TOTEM POLES.

How They Serve the Haida Indians to Display the Crests of the Families.

The Haida Indians are divided into two groups of families, the Raven people and the Eagle people. It is GREAT WORK OF ART ALMOST forbidden for a man of the Rayen group to marry a woman of the same group, and for a man of the Eagle group to marry in his group. Each of these groups is subdivided into a number of families. Most of these families bear the names of certain localities, and were originally village communities, but are considered as



llowed among them.

Each family has a number of crests. nost of which illustrate certain tradiions of the family.

These Indians are in the habit of recting in front of their houses arved poles-"totem poles" - on which the crests of the families of both husband and wife are represented. The dead are buried in or on similar poles, while others are erected

in memory of deceased chiefs. The illustration accompanying this article (sketched from the model of an original pole which belongs in the Museum of Natural History, New York city), represents a memorial column Best of Everything edity), represents a memorial column erected in memory of several members of a family of the Raven clan. Both of the principal designs represent the personified snag. Above he is represented as a sea lion, but with blowhole and dorsal fin. Below he has the shape of a whale. The banded shaft between the two is a drift-log.

# **PAINTING HIDES**

LEADS TO TRAGEDY.

BATTLE BESIDE DEATHBED

Celebrated Canvas Results in Present of Sword from Mikado Which Nearly Causes Destruction of Two Men.

Chicago.-In the soft tones and mellow shadings of a painting just hung at the Art Institute lies concealed a tragedy as strange as fiction. In creating the painting-its formal title is 'Niko Gate to the Royal Tombs'the artist, not unlilke Frankenstein, brought into being a thing that almost led to his own destruction.

The first act of the weird drama was laid in Japan, where the mikado, as an evidence of his appreciation of the work of John Devereux York, of Chicago, who painted the "Niko Gate," presented the artist with a sword which for centuries had been an beirloom of the imperial family. Next the scene shifted to Chicago, where the artist attempted to kill himself at the bedside of his dying mother with the selfsame blade. In a struggle to disarm him his uncle was wounded almost to death.

The curtain scene was in St. Luke's hospital, where York, no longer in a suicidal mood, spent night and day at the bedside of the wounded uncle. By tender nursing the patient was saved. The uncle is Holger de Roode, well-known insurance man.

The revelation of the tragedy did not become known until the other night, though the action was several weeks ago. The occasion was when Mr. York's mother, Mrs. E. J. T. Brooke, lay dying at her home. Physicians said she could not recover. Mr York, a son by a former marriage, had watched at her bedside constantly for a week, and when the doctors announced that she must die, he determined to die with her.

In the room where his mother lay unconscious was a case containing bric-a-brac which Mr. York had gathered in his travels through Europe

Mr. de Roode, a brother of Mrs. Brooke, was bending over his dying sister when he saw his nephew take he sword from the case.

Mr. de Roode fell to the floor. Blood streamed from the wound in a torrest Mr. York suddenly regained his senses and ran to a telephone. He called a physician, and the injured man was aken at once to the hospital, where he ay four weeks hovering between life and death. He recovered, and is now able to attend to his business, although still suffering from the wound.

Mrs. Brooke, mother of Artist York never regained consciousness, and died without knowing of her son's attempt to kill himself, which nearly cost the life of her brother.

Mr. de Roode's wife is an invalid, and until his complete recovery the unfortunate affair was kept from her for fear the news would cause her death. During the time he was in the hospital a story was invented that he was called to New York on business



Johnson, of the New York Athletic club, won the 100-yard championshis with the trudgeon stroke, which is now so popular with the swimmers. After he introduced this new stroke the side motion saw its decline and the shorter distance swimmers began learning the trudge. It went well at first for the short distances, but many pronounced it too tiring for a mile. Several swimmers finally mastered it for the big distances and about five years ago be gan swimming a mile.
