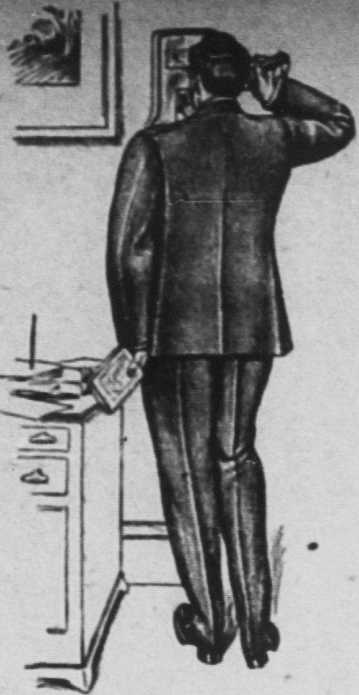

**REMARKABLE WOMAN
MAY BE PRESENT**

At the Dedication Services of the New Organ which is to be Installed at the Church of the Redeemer

When dedication services are held in connection with the new organ which is to be installed at the Church of the Redeemer in January next, it is expected that one of the most remarkable women in the country will be present. The woman is Miss Mattie Morehouse, of Newark, N. J. Miss Morehouse was born deaf and dumb, and at the age of 8 years lost her sight. Shortly afterward her sense of taste and smell left her, and now only one of the five senses remain, that of touch. Notwithstanding all this, she is a decidedly wonderful woman, and in some respects is like Helen Keller, who is by far the greatest wonder the world has ever seen.

Her deaf mute friends in this section are particularly anxious to have her come to Sayre and are now raising money to pay her expenses. The woman is cared for by John W. Gates, the millionaire, and a sister of C. R. Bennett, of Hoover street, Sayre, is her guardian and legal advisor. Miss Morehouse, while unable to see, hear or talk, is by no means idle. Her principal occupation is weaving cane seats in chairs. In fact she does most anything with cane. She also weaves braid in a fancy manner and recently made a handsome braid cover for a bible. Miss Morehouse reads the sign language of the deaf mute by placing her hand upon the wrist of the speaker and by the motion of the arm understands what is meant. Those who have seen her say that her ability to understand and do things is marvellous.

It is expected that the new organ will be placed in the church about the 8th of January, in which event the dedication services will occur about the 15th, and if Miss Morehouse comes to Sayre she will be present at these services.

**BORROWED ENGINE
BROUGHT DISASTER**

D. S. & S. Locomotive With a Record Was Purchased With the Coxe Interests by the Lehigh

An engine which will recall vividly to old railroad men a disaster which occurred on the Lehigh Valley some years ago, has recently been brought to the Pennsylvania division and is now doing service. The engine referred to is known as No. 9 and it formerly belonged to the D. S. & S. railroad. When the Lehigh purchased the Coxe interests it also acquired this railroad and its equipment.

Some years ago, however, the Lehigh Valley had occasion to borrow some motive power and No. 9 was loaned from the D. S. & S. The engine made a trip down the road but before the trip was finished the engine blew up. The boiler was blown clear from the frame. The fireman and brakeman were killed while the engineer was seriously injured. The engine and its boiler were taken to the shops and repaired, after which it was returned to its owners. Today is the first time it has been on the Lehigh Valley since the accident.

MAGNIFICENT OPENING

The work is supposed to have been done by amateurs. The police in the surrounding towns have been notified.

AGAIN IN OPERATION

The Sayre Water Company's three million gallon pump, which has been out of commission for some time undergoing repairs, is again in operation. The company's pumping plant is now in duplicate. In case of accident to one or the other of the big machines there is still one in reserve to do the work.

RESERVOIR IN OPERATION

The Lehigh Valley railroad company has commenced pumping water into its new reservoir, which was recently completed. A portion of the company shops is being supplied by the reservoir, while the remainder is still connected with the Sayre Water Company's mains.

PUNCTURED WOUND

Con. Brewer, a laborer employed at the shops, was struck on the left hand by the head of a spike which he had struck with a sledge, and sustained a punctured wound.

**SUSTAINED PAINFUL
INJURY TO HIS EYE**

Dr. M. A. Hunter Was Handling a Crooks Tube When the Lateral Exploded.

Dr. M. A. Hunter met with a painful injury to his right eye at his office on Packer avenue yesterday while engaged in detaching the Crooks tubes from his x ray machine. The tubes are of glass and when they are new on the inside is an almost perfect vacuum. Continued use forms a perfect vacuum and the slightest pressure on the outside will cause them to burst. Yesterday an agent called at Dr. Hunter's office. The former sold supplies for the machines and as the tubes in the machine needed replacing the doctor placed an order for new ones. As he was in the act of taking them from the machine one of them gave way to his touch and exploded. A piece of the glass struck his right eye, cutting through the conjunctiva near the retina. The sight was not injured but the wound was decidedly painful. Unless inflammation develops no serious consequences will follow. He went to the hospital where the injury was attended to.

COAL THIEVES**

Lehigh Valley Officers Have Several Alleged Culprits Under Arrest at Towanda

Special officer Jesse Doty of the Lehigh Valley detective force, assisted by officers Miller, Hollon and Watson of Towanda, arrested Lyman Heeman, Sr., John Lyman, Jr., Francis and Henry Heeman, on a charge of stealing coal from the Lehigh Valley. The defendants are all residents of Towanda and their arrest is the beginning of a crusade which the Lehigh Valley will make against coal thieves during the coming winter. The Heemans will be given a hearing before Justice Orcutt at Towanda on November 21.
