MITCHELL IN WEST VIRGINIA.

Labor Leader Welcomed by Three Thousand Miners.

M'DONALD, W. Va., Nov. 13.—All the coal mines in and around McDougal were closed at noon yesterday in honor of John Mitchell, president of the United Mine Workers of America, and fully 3,000 miners crowded the streets to welcome their leader.

President Mitchell was enthusiastically cheered when in his speech at Lafayette hall he repeated his statement made several days ago that "as long as I remain in my official capacity I will never submit to a reduction of the present wage scale."

Mr. Mitchell urged the miners to keep in constant communication with their local unions, to encourage gatherings such as the present one and to make a study of labor and economic questions, and in closing he urged the miners to take an interest in elections and vote for the candidate who would represent them the best.

French Trade Unions.  
The growth of trade unionism in France has been very rapid. The title under which the unions are known in France is "Syndicats Professionnels." They were first authorized by law in 1884—a little over 20 years ago.

#### TRADE CONDITIONS.

R. G. Dun & Co.'s Weekly Business Report.

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review of trade says: A temporary flurry in the money market had little deleterious effect in commercial channels, most reports indicating a further increase in the volume of business. Orders come forward freely for distant delivery, and buyers experience much difficulty in making purchases for quick shipment. Wholesale trade in holiday goods is now well under way, and retail distribution of seasonable merchandise responds to the generally lower temperature.

Manufacturing plants have scarcely a drawback except scarcity of labor in a few instances and small strikes that interrupt structural work to some extent. Traffic conditions have improved, and railway earnings for the first week in November were 49 per cent larger than in the corresponding time last year, while the official statement of foreign commerce for the month of October showed a very large increase. Last Saturday's bank statement showed a deficit for the first time in over three years, and fell money during the week rose to 25 per cent, but liquidation in securities and receipt of funds from the interior and foreign money markets soon brought a more normal quotation. Bank exchanges at New York were 42 per cent larger than last year, while at other leading cities the gain averaged 8 per cent.

Commercial failures for the week were 210 against 183 last week, 292 the preceding week and 217 the corresponding week last year.

Sunflower Stalks as Fuel.  
In Russia dried sunflower stalks almost entirely replace firewood. In fact, these stalks are preferred even to pine wood, producing a quick and hot flame fire. Sunflower stalks are also used for heating purposes, not only in private houses, but in large factories. They are burned in grates specially designed for their consumption.

Climate and Brain.
