

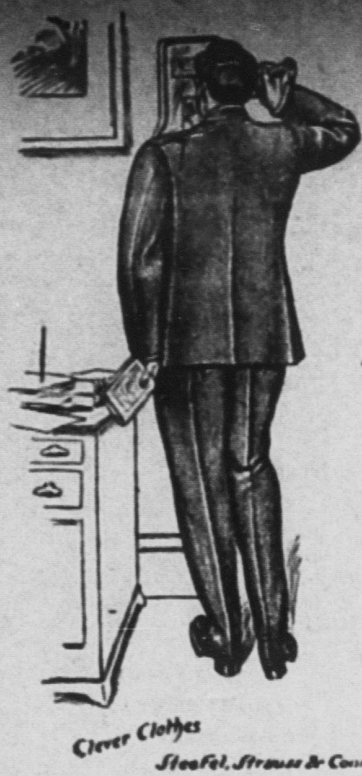

EJECTED FROM A
LEHIGH TRAIN

Game Warden Ran Into the Wrong Bunch at Laceyville Thursday Night--Was Slapped in the Face and Otherwise Roughly Handled

Amid the indignant hisses and jeers of a carload of passengers Game Warden Shoemaker, whose zeal to punish violators of the fish and game laws has earned the just contempt of every sportsman in this section, was ejected from the Lehigh Valley evening local near Laceyville on Thursday night, after he had been punched in the face by a Wilkesbarre hunter whom he had attempted to search for ferrets.

The latest escapade of this over-officious game warden is an interesting tale, and if he is possessed of even an atom of ordinary common sense he will not repeat it. Thursday evening a party of Wilkesbarre hunters boarded the evening local near Wyalusing. The party was quite a large one and the day had been spent in the woods near Wyalusing hunting for small game. When the train reached Laceyville, Shoemaker boarded the coach occupied by the hunting party. With no other authority than his badge he immediately began a search to ascertain if any of the men were carrying ferrets. He did not proceed far. One of the Wilkesbarre men, a big husky fellow, slapped Mr. Shoemaker in the face and the sound made by the blow was heard throughout the entire car. For a moment it looked as if the other members of the party might also play a tat-too on the game warden's brazen cheeks, but just as matters looked serious the conductor of the train, who is anything but an intransigent, told the obstreperous warden that his presence was not desired and to get off before he was thrown out bodily. Gently urged by the big frame of the conductor the warden beat a hasty retreat. The passengers hooted and jeered and hurled epithets at the discomfited warden that were not of a complimentary nature. When the hunting party reached Wilkesbarre they were met by two game wardens for that section. They tried to "butt in" but were brushed one side and the hunting party reached their homes without incident.

In the meantime Shoemaker decided to seek redress and sent a message to Supt. Kinney of this division, stating that he had been ejected from one of the company's trains and demanded that something be done about it. It is said that when the superintendent received the message that a smile overspread his good natured features worth going miles to see. It is also said that he informed the game warden that all complaints of that nature, in order to get a hearing, must be made in writing. The warden has not been heard from since.

It is said, however, that the company officials will take the matter up with the district attorney of this county and see if there is not some means that can be devised to keep the warden off the Lehigh trains unless he is clothed with due process of law.

FOOT BALL GAME
WAS CANCELED

Waverly Wanted Sayre to Put Up More Money, Which Request Was Refused, and Contest Was Declared Off

There was to have been a football game on the driving park at Athens this afternoon. The contesting teams were to have been the Sayre Athens combination and an eleven from Waverly. The game failed to materialize, and the Sayre players say that the fault lies with the aggregation from Waverly, or rather with its management. When the arrangements were made for the game the managers of the Sayre Athens team say that they guaranteed the Waverly bunch a certain sum, including expenses, etc., which at the time was apparently satisfactory. The game was advertised in the newspapers and an order for hand bills was in the hands of a job printer, but before it was executed the Sayre players claim that the Waverly artists "washed." That is, they came to Sayre and wanted more money as a guarantee. The amount they asked for represented a sum twice the original guarantee and the management of the Sayre aggregation wouldn't stand for it. They thought it large enough and if the Waverly players wanted a game on the original terms they could have it. The Waverly team, however, persisted in their demands, and the upshot is that lovers of the national game were deprived this afternoon of witnessing an exciting contest. The Sayre players are inclined to think that Waverly wanted to crawl out and that demanding more money as a guarantee was an excuse to crawlfish. In fact the local team make no bones of accusing the Waverly outfit of being afraid. Waverly, however, will strenuously deny this allegation and will say that they wanted a guarantee sufficient to make them safe.

JAMES DUGGAN

James Duggan, 77 years old, died this morning at 4:30 o'clock at his residence, No 112 North Hopkins street, after a long illness. He had been afflicted with valvular heart trouble for some years and for the past two weeks had been in a critical condition.
