DR. LIFF DELIVERED INTERESTING ADDRESS

Small Audience Listens to a Charming Story Filled With Pathos and Humor

Athens—If the people of Athens had been one hundredth part as patriotic as were the citizens of our great republic in the times of '61 and '65 when the life of the nation was in peril, or had they felt the interest in the recital of the sacrifice and deprivations heroically borne by our boys in blue, the M. E. church would have been crowded to the doors last evening to hear the story from one of the most eloquent divines on the platform. As it was there were probably 150 persons present.

Dr. Thomas Liff was one of the boys who suffered these deprivations, but last evening he dwelt on the brighter side of the picture. His story was full of pathos, humor and absorbing interest. He began at the beginning, giving the incidents of leaving home and his preliminary drill and entry into the cavalry service. His home on the southern borders of Ohio, near the Kentucky line, which was the scene of so much bitter contention between the champions of freedom and slavery, gave to his enlistment a thrilling story of patriotic enthusiasm. He served in the cavalry under Kilpatrick, that dashing cavalier who always struck the enemy where most vulnerable and carried his colors to the vantage ground of victory, where smoke and fire were thickest.

We regret that space will not permit us to describe at length the first battle, the cheer of letters from home and sweetheart, and the final march with Sherman to the sea. History gives no greater achievement than has this great march, whereby uncle Billy went in at one "rat hole" and came out and accomplished the result of cutting the southern confederacy in two by the capture of Fort McAllister. His return home and the reunion with those who had waited long, watched and prayed for his return, is a war chapter which every veteran has experienced.

In the grand finale of this eloquent lecture Dr. Liff paid a fitting tribute to the great men of our nation, and also tender sentiments for Old Glory. The memory of this worthy lecture will ever remain fragrant in the minds of the few who showed their patriotic interest by their attendance.
