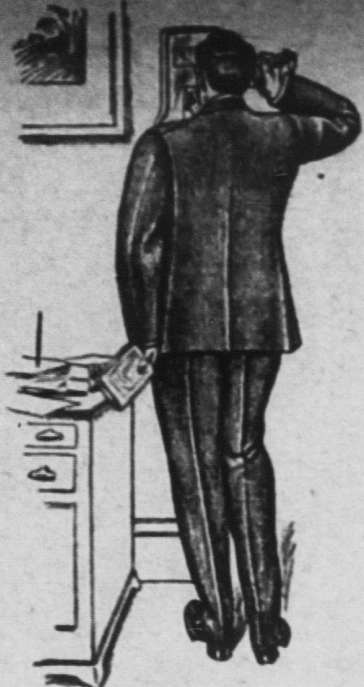

**DEATH REMOVES  
WELL KNOWN CITIZEN**

**Justice of the Peace John R. Murray Expired at an Early Hour This Morning After an Illness of Several Weeks**

John R. Murray, one of Sayre's oldest and best known citizens died at his home, No. 116 South Elmer avenue, this morning at 1:45 o'clock. The immediate cause of death was heart failure due to a complication of diseases with which he had been afflicted for some time.

The death of Mr. Murray will come as a severe shock to the majority of his many friends in Sayre, although those who were intimately acquainted with him were aware some time ago that the physicians who were attending him had little hopes of his recovery. Early in September last he began to fail, and was able to be at his office on Desmond street only a part of the time. Since the first of October he has practically been confined to the house. On election day he went to the polling place on Pack-er avenue and voted. A day or two later he walked to his brother's house on North Elmer avenue, and that was the last time that he left his home.

For the past two or three days he had been in a delirious condition and part of the time was unable to recognize his friends. Yesterday he did not take any nourishment and shortly after 7 o'clock he failed rapidly. Just a few moments previous to his death he rallied somewhat and was lifted from his bed. While in an upright position he collapsed and his heart ceased to beat. His sorrowing family are receiving the heartfelt sympathy of the entire community.

For years John R. Murray had been a prominent figure in Sayre. He came to this place about 23 years ago from Waverly and engaged in the notion and dry goods business in a building where the Teed block now stands. Later he erected the frame building on Desmond street which is now occupied by Sterling's restaurant. There he also conducted a notion and dry goods business. Mr. Murray was one of the first men to engage in business in Sayre. In 1891 Sayre was incorporated as a borough and at the first election held thereafter Mr. Murray was elected a justice of the peace, which office he continued to hold until the time of his death. He also served a number of terms as clerk of the borough council.

As a peace officer Mr. Murray had few superiors. He was held in high esteem by the legal fraternity in this section and his opinions were always accorded the greatest respect. He conducted the affairs of the office with strict impartiality and held the distinction of never having one of his decisions reversed by a higher court. He was a member of the Odd Fellows, the Royal Arcanum and the National Protective Legion.

The death of Mr. Murray removes a man who will be greatly missed. He had a jovial disposition, was a charming conversationalist, and by reason of his superior legal knowledge his advice and services were eagerly sought. Mr. Murray was always ready to do a friendly act for any one in distress and was possessed of the admirable qualities which go to make up a good citizen, a loving husband and a kind father.

John R. Murray was born in Orange county, N. Y., sixty years ago last February and when but a small child removed with his parents to Tioga county, N. Y. They settled on West Hill, near Waverly, and at the old academy in Waverly Mr. Murray received his early education. When a young man he entered the law office of Attorney Dexter in Waverly, and after reading the required length of time was admitted to the New York state bar. At that time David B. Hill was chairman of the law committee. Mr. Murray passed the examination

prepared by M. Hill and stood the highest in a class numbering nearly an hundred. He practiced law in Waverly for some time and also held the office of justice of the peace in that village. Mr. Murray possessed unusual ability as an orator and for many years he was called upon to address public gatherings.

Besides his wife he is survived by two children, Dr. A. H. Murray and Miss Laura Murray, both of this place. Two brothers, W. T. of this place, and George of Waverly, also survive.

The funeral will be held from his late home on South Elmer avenue on Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. The remains will be taken to the family plot in Forest Home cemetery at Waverly for interment.

**MISTAKEN IDENTITY**

A well known Sayre young man is going about with his right hand done up in a neat white bandage as the result of an injury which he received the other night while attending to his duties connected with a certain clothing store. It appears that it is the duty of the young man on Sunday nights to go to the store and light the gas so that it will burn all night; thus allowing the night watchman to obtain a good view of the interior. On Sunday night last he went to the store as usual, and while he was in the act of striking a match he saw the form of a man leering toward him. Knowing that the intruder was there for no good purpose the young man dropped the match and his strong right arm shot out and smash his brawny fist went against the face of the man. But lo and behold! instead of striking a real live man his fist struck one of the clothing dummies which had been allowed to stand in the centre of the floor. The plaster paris face of the dummy was smashed into a thousand pieces, and the young man's fist was so badly bruised that he was compelled to visit a surgeon.

**SHOULD BE REPAIRED**

The condition of the floors in the rooms which are used to accommodate the grand jury witnesses at the court house in Towanda demands the attention of the county officials, and if the present grand jury wishes to win encomiums of praise the members should recommend that either new floors should be placed or the old ones repaired. As the floors now stand they are dangerous and some day some one will fall through them, and then the county will become defendant in a suit for damages.

**ENGINEER INJURED**

John H. Barber, a Lehigh Valley engineer who rooms in the Lockhart building, sustained a severe injury to his forehead last night while his train was passing through the eastbound yards. The train was running at a slow rate of speed when he looked out of the cab window and was struck by a semaphore, inflicting a gash in the right side of the forehead 1 1/2 inches long. The hospital surgeons were compelled to take several stitches to close the wound.

The Ithaca organization will come prepared to put up a strong game and the local players want to bear this in mind. Get out this evening and practice or else go into Saturday's game with the expectation of getting walloped good and plenty. The captain of the Ithaca team is old "Come on Bill," who at one time was the famous Athens full-back.
