INSURANCE GRAFT AN OLD STORY.

Aged Man Who Was Called "Rantankerous" Says He Fenra Nothing From Hughes' Searchlight. Contradicts Mchols.

NEW YORK, Nov. 24 .- W. S. Manning of Albany, Chauncey M. Depew's 'friend from up the river," who gets 'rantankerous about this time every year," was on hand in the city hall when the legislative insurance committee resumed its hearing.

Mr. Manning is seventy-one years Thanks to a pair of mild blue eyes, his flowing beard and snow white hair, he is much more friendly in appearance than "rantankerous." the session began he had, by his request, a two minute consultation with Charles E. Hughes, counsel for the committee, He said that he wanted to tell everything he knew, and seemed to anticipate much pleasure in the opportunity to do so.

"I fear nothing as the result of this investigation," he said to a reporter before the session was convened. "My record is clear. I have been a consistent opponent of these people for years. My arguments will show that.

"Why, this investigation should have been forestalled long ago. If they had istened to me the whole insurance matter would bave been ventilated in the eighties.

"As to Nichols and his testimony, I shall dispose of that when I get on the stand. He must have been suffering from lapse of memory when he testified. If I am 'rantankerous,' or if the insurance people think I am, I guess it's because they realize their own shortcomings. But the public knows of their shortcomings by this time."
