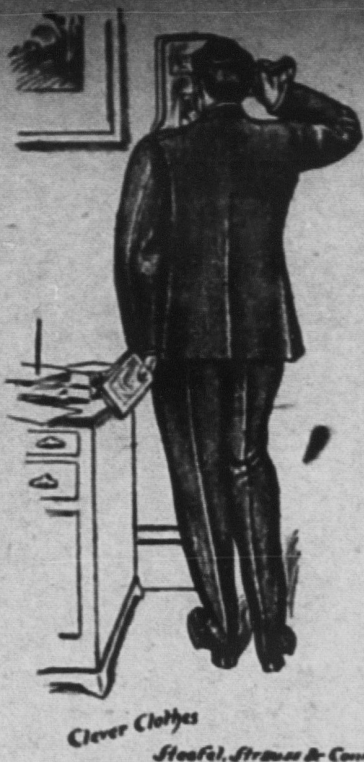

**RESIGNS PASTORATE
OF BAPTIST CHURCH**

Rev. Ira W. Bingham Has Accepted Call of the Cavalry Baptist Church at Norwich, N. Y.—Mr. Bingham's Decision Has Caused Keen Regret Among the People of Sayre

The Rev. Ira W. Bingham, who has been the pastor of the Baptist church in Sayre since January, 1901, last night tendered his resignation to take effect on the first of the coming January. For the past two weeks it has been known that Mr. Bingham was considering a call from Calvary Baptist church of Norwich, N. Y., and therefore his decision to resign his charge in this place can hardly be considered in the nature of a surprise.

Four weeks ago Mr. Bingham went to Norwich and preached in the Calvary church. A week or ten days later he received a call and has since had the same under consideration. At a meeting held in the church last night Mr. Bingham's resignation was handed to the church clerk who read it to the congregation present.

At the covenant meeting which is to be held on Tuesday next the resignation will be read and action taken.

Mr. Bingham's decision to leave Sayre was made after mature deliberation and it will be keenly regretted, not only by the members of his congregation, to whom he had become endeared, but by the people of Sayre at large. During his five years' pastorate Mr. Bingham has, irrespective of creed or denominational affiliations, won won the high regard and sincere respect of all, and his presence will be missed by everyone with whom he came in contact, either in a religious, social or business capacity. His congregation will unfeignedly feel that they have met with a personal loss.

Mr. Bingham's new field will be much larger than the one in which he has worked while in Sayre. Norwich is situated in Chenango county, N. Y., a few miles north-east of Binghamton, and is one of the prettiest towns in that section. It has a population of about 8,000 souls, and the church to which he has been called is attended by a large and active congregation. Mr. Bingham met with signal success while working in Sayre and The Record predicts that he will meet with the same success in his new charge. In fact, the congregation of the Norwich church is to be congratulated upon the fact that he has decided to accept the call.

Mr. Bingham is a native of Spencer, N. Y., and his parents now reside in that place. He received his preliminary education in the Spencer high school and shortly after attaining his majority he entered Colgate university at Hamilton, N. Y., and took the theological course. After completing the course he was ordained a minister in the Baptist church and accepted a call to the church at this place. Therefore the charge in Sayre was his first. His labors here have been crowned with success. He is an able young man and delivers clear and convincing sermons. Mr. Bingham's future is a bright one.

**DIPHTHERIA CAUSES
DEATH OF CHILD**

Carl Sumner, Five Years Old, Succumbs to Dread Malady Yesterday Afternoon

Carl Sumner, the five-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Chester Sumner, of No. 200 Mill street, died yesterday afternoon between three and four o'clock. Death was due to diphtheria. The child had been complaining for two or three days and yesterday morning Dr. H. L. Towner was called. The child was found to be in a serious condition and the matter was reported to the board of health. Spencer Brougham, the health officer, was sent to quarantine the house, but when he arrived the child was dead. The quarantine notice was tacked on the door, however, and the funeral of the dead child was held privately this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.

FINAL REPORT

The grand jury finished its work yesterday morning and was discharged by the court. The final report of the jury contained recommendations concerning various bridges throughout the county. The court house and jail were found in sanitary condition and everything in proper shape with the exception of the floors in the rooms adjoining the quarters occupied by the grand jury. The jury recommended that these floors be reconstructed at once of concrete. District Attorney Mills was highly complimented for the efficient manner in which he had presented the various cases, and a vote of thanks was extended to the foreman of the jury. The jury reported against a proposed bridge at Wysox. A true bill was found against Francis Heeman for larceny and receiving, and George W. Hicks for desertion. The jury failed to indict Charley Vanderpool for assault with intent to have carnal knowledge.

**SAYRE HUNTERS
HAD GREAT LUCK**

Shot Black Bear Weighing 400 Pounds in the Pocono Mountains

Fred H. Hartman, the well known Lehigh Valley engineer and base ball twirler, returned last night from a week's hunting trip in the Pocono mountains and the story he is telling to his friends this morning will make the eye of the hunters in this section turn pea green with envy. Mr. Hartman was accompanied on the trip by Harry Santee of this place, Al Santee and John Smith of Butler Valley, and William Stubbs of Blakeslee. All were armed to the teeth, and while they occasionally shot at small game to while away the time, bears and such like animals were really what they were after.

Late Wednesday afternoon, just before darkness had settled over the face of the earth, the party discovered a huge black bear lying beneath the roots of an overturned tree. Bruin had evidently made his winter quarters but had not yet entered upon his long nap. Therefore, when the hunters approached to within hearing distance he hastily scrambled from his nest. With a growl he rose on his hind legs, at the same time exhibiting two rows of long white teeth. This attitude on the part of the bear caused consternation in camp of the hunters. The Sayre contingent was attacked with buck fever and did several stunts that even caused the bear to grin. Finally, however, Al Santee raised his rifle and fired. Bruin dropped dead in his tracks. The party secured a horse and wagon to take the bear to Blakeslee where it was dressed. It weighed 400 pounds, and was one of the finest specimens that has been shot in the Pocono mountains in years.

One of the amusing incidents of the trip was the fact that the bear broke up a prayer meeting which was in progress in a small church. Someway it got noised about that a large bear had been shot and the worshipers left the church to get a sight of the animal.

FUNERAL THIS AFTERNOON

Rathbun, J. E. Wheelock and Grant Follet. The remains were taken to the Forest Home cemetery at Waverly and laid in the family burial plot.

**PTOMAIN POISON
MADE FAMILY ILL**

Mrs. J. C. Strubel and Two Children Ate Poisoned Cheese With Serious Results.

Mrs. J. C. Strubel and her two children of No. 331 Pennsylvania avenue, South Waverly, were in a critical condition last night for a few hours from having eaten a quantity of cheese which contained ptomaine poison. The cheese was purchased at a certain store on Broad street in Waverly and was eaten at supper by the members of the Strubel family, with the exception of Mr. Strubel. They grew worse and at midnight Dr. M. A. Hunter, of this place, was called. He found Mrs. Strubel in a serious condition, but the children had vomited, thereby throwing off a considerable portion of the poison. After a few hours hard work on the part of the physician Mrs. Strubel slowly recovered from the effects of the poison. Today she is pronounced out of danger, but is still confined to the bed.

On Monday night last the family of Ernest Rockwell, of Spring street, were poisoned by eating cheese which was purchased at the same store as was the cheese which was eaten by the Strubel family last night. If this be true the grocer should be made to remove the cheese from his store or at least refuse to offer it for sale.

KNIFE SLIPPED

While H. E. Crayton of First street, Athens, was cutting a rubber diaphragm from a vestibule coach at the car shops this morning the knife he was using slipped and the blade entered the middle finger of the left hand between the second and knuckle joints. The cut extended to the bone and will lay Mr. Crayton up for some days. Dr. E. J. Everitt dressed the injury.
