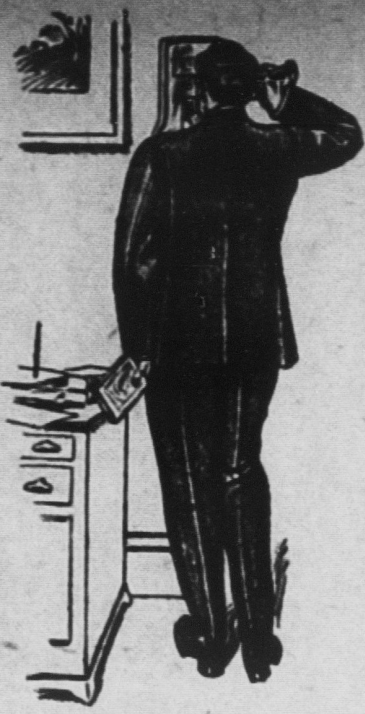

**AN AGED RESIDENT
EXPIRED YESTERDAY**

**Zury L. Travis, 89 Years Old,
Died at His Daughter's Home
on South Elmer Avenue**

Zury L. Travis, 89 years old, died yesterday afternoon at 4:15 o'clock at the home of his daughter, Mrs. James N. Weaver, of South Elmer avenue, following an illness which began nearly a year ago. Last Christmas Mr. Travis was taken ill and has since been confined to the house more or less. Yesterday, however, nothing unusual was noted in his condition until just a moment previous to his death when he asked to be raised in bed. His request was complied with but when he was laid back on his pillow he collapsed and death ensued.

The deceased was born in Burlington, this county, and for thirty years followed the occupation of a farmer. Years ago he came to Sayre and accepted a position in the Lehigh Valley shops under J. N. Weaver, who was then master mechanic. About eight years ago he went to Wilkes-Barre and for a time resided with his son, L. L. Travis, a well known Lehigh Valley engineer. Two years ago he returned to Sayre and has since resided with his daughter at this place. His daughter and son survive him.

The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock from the house. The Rev. F. T. Cady, rector of the Church of the Redeemer, and Rev. J. F. Warner, pastor of the Methodist church, will officiate and the remains will be taken to the Forest Home cemetery at Waverly for interment.

**BAD WRECK ON
S. & N. Y. LAST NIGHT**

**Unverified Report Says One Man
Was Killed and Two Possibly
Fatally Injured**

An unverified report has been received to the effect that a disastrous wreck occurred on the Susquehanna and New York railroad last night at 8 o'clock near Wheelersville, one man being killed, one fatally injured and a third buried under a mass of wreckage. The officials of the road are at the scene of the wreck but no information is obtainable. The wreck is said to have been caused by a number of cars which in some manner had been run on to the main tracks and that a freight train crashed into them.

Later reports concerning the wreck say that David Harmon, a brakeman who resides at Jersey Shore, is the name of the man who was killed. The names of the two other men could not be obtained. It is also said that the shift of cars being on the main tracks was due to the carelessness of a trainman who had failed to set the brakes. The siding on which the cars had been placed was on a grade descending toward the main tracks, and with nothing to hold them it was an easy matter for them to move out on to the latter.

The wreck is an expensive one for the company. The shift of cars were smashed into a tangled mass of iron and wood, while the engine of the freight train was almost completely demolished. The wrecking crew has been working all night and day removing the wreckage.

WILL ABANDON OVERCOATS

Yesterday Superintendent Loetzer was engaged in flushing the hydrants in certain districts covered by the water company in Sayre. Mr. Loetzer says that this year the hydrants will not wear "overcoats." Heretofore it has been customary previous to winter's setting in to cover the various hydrants in order to prevent freezing. Last winter hydrants which were covered succumbed to the elements the same as those which were unprotected. Therefore it has been decided that the work involved in covering them is practically useless inasmuch as it does not accomplish the desired end.

ORDERED OUT OF TOWN

A young negro who was beginning from door to door on South Wilbur avenue and Miller street this afternoon was turned over to Chief of Police Walsh. The latter led the colored youth over to Desmond street and showed him the way to Athens, with admonition to get out of Sayre as quickly as his legs would carry and never return. The youth traveled.

STOLE BANANAS

A number of boys at Hazel Brook broke into a Lehigh Valley freight car and secured several bunches of bananas. Later the boys were apprehended. They work for the company and their parents succeeded in gaining the consent of the officials to deduct the worth of the bananas from their monthly wages.

The county commissioners have been notified that the new bridge at Ulster will be inspected Friday, December 8, instead of December 1. There is a small section of the brick paving which will probably be finished today.

**LEHIGH VALLEY
RAILROAD NOTES**

**Large Number of Men Needed at
the New Shops—Capacity of
Road Taxed to the Limit**

Three hundred men can now be used in the new Lehigh Valley shops at this place at once. This statement was made on excellent authority this morning. The men needed are machinists, boiler makers, blacksmiths and helpers. New men are being taken on every day, but the company is experiencing difficulty in securing the number needed. Eventually 1500 skilled and unskilled mechanics will be required to operate the shops, but just where they are to come from is not as yet known. The company officials have been endeavoring for some time to induce the men in the Wilkes-Barre shops to remove to Sayre. A few of the men have accepted situations here but there is still needed hundreds of others.

At the present time the Lehigh Valley is in a decidedly prosperous condition. The capacity of the road is being taxed to the limit. Every car on the line is in use. Recently an order was placed for 3,000 new cars and there is use for several thousand more, but the company is unable to get them. As a matter of fact the big car building concerns are unable to supply the demand. The officials of the latter concerns say that they are unable to get the raw material and that if they had it their plants are not large enough to make cars fast enough to supply the needs of the various roads throughout the country. At the present time it is said that 135,000 cars are needed by the railroads in the United States. Never before in the history of railroading has a similar condition prevailed. In just what manner the situation will be met is as yet undetermined.
