

OPERA HOUSE AN ASSURED FACT

Plans Have Been Made by Which Sayre will be Provided a Modern Play House—Will Cost in the Neighborhood of \$20,000.

"An opera house for Sayre is an assured fact." The foregoing statement was made this morning to a Record representative by a well known and reliable business man. When questioned further he declared that within the past three or four days a certain proposition made by out of town parties had been carefully considered and within a few months Sayre would be provided with a first class modern play house that will not only be a credit to the town but which will be conducted in such a manner as to receive the unqualified support of the amusement loving public.

Last night there was a persistent rumor to the effect that certain parties had visited Sayre recently for the purpose of getting local capital interested in the building of an opera house. It was also said that the matter had gone far enough to give practical assurance that a theatre would be erected. This morning a Record man went to the bottom of the rumor and learned that it had excellent foundation. For certain well defined reasons those who are interested in the proposition desire that their names be withheld but at the proper time they will be given to the public. As matters now stand, however, the capital necessary to erect the building is forthcoming and all that remains is to secure a suitable site, remodel certain plans which have already been considered, and let the contract.

The proposed theatre will cost in the neighborhood of \$20,000. Part of this money is to be furnished by a party from out of town who has made an investigation of the conditions here and who has no hesitancy in investing his money in the enterprise. The remainder will be provided by certain Sayre interests.

It is proposed to secure a site in the central part of Sayre, and it is quite probable that a location other than in the business section will be looked for. This does not mean that the theatre will be erected in an out of the way place, but at a point where it will be handy for everyone. The building will be erected for theatre purposes only and the stage and the auditorium will be on the ground floor. So far as practical it will be patterned after Shea's theatre in Buffalo, which has been one of the most successful houses in the country. There will be no gallery, but boxes will be arranged on each side in such a manner that the occupants can get a full view of the stage. The floor will be slanting and seating capacity will be provided for 1200 people. The stage will be large enough to accommodate the large shows and the stage entrance will be constructed so that horses, or other unusual stage equipment can be used without trouble.

The building will be fire proof and enough exits will be provided to allow the people to pass out in less than two minutes in case anything should happen. In fact the theatre is to be first class in every respect and will be conducted on a first class basis. As it is to be a ground floor play house it will be run in the summer as well as in the winter.

In the course of two or three weeks the Record will be able to give its readers a definite story as to the time when the work of construction will begin and other interesting details which at this time are being carefully worked out.

AUTHORITIES WILL CONDUCT INQUEST

Towanda's Awful Tragedy to be the Subject of a Rigid Investigation

The authorities at Towanda have decided to investigate the awful holocaust which occurred in Towanda township on Sunday morning at which time the home of William Ackley was destroyed by fire and two of the inmates were burned to death. On account of the inability of Coroner Holcomb to attend to the matter, Justice of the Peace Charles M. Hall will hold an inquest tomorrow afternoon. A jury of six has been summoned and the awful affair will be probed to the bottom.

Since yesterday the Towanda police officials have entertained the opinion that the fire may have been of incendiary origin. The inmates of the house who escaped are positive that there were no lights in any of the rooms, and it is thought that some one may have poured oil into the bed room through a window and then set fire to it. Several circumstances surrounding the fire have given rise to suspicion.

Charles Whitmiller, husband of Rebecca Whitmiller, whose child was burned, and George Vanderpool, husband of Mary Shaylor, who was also a fire victim, both claim that they slept at the "Seaside," and consequently knew nothing of the fire.

Whitmiller and his wife quarreled Saturday and she took her child and went to Ackley's house. George Vanderpool furnished the evidence on which his wife was convicted and sent to the penitentiary for chicken stealing, and when these facts are put together the authorities believe that there are at least grounds for a rigid investigation. The people connected with the affair are doubtless a bad lot, and when the details of the happenings which immediately preceded the fire are made public it would not be at all surprising if a Senegambian were found in the wood pile.

BLIZZARD STRIKES SAYRE

Between 9 and 10 o'clock this morning a blizzard of no small proportions struck Sayre and until nearly 1 o'clock the air was filled with snow and the ground was covered to the extent of two inches. The snow was of the damp variety and the man with the shovel had plenty of opportunity to exercise.

Peckham of New York will remain at the store for the ensuing two weeks and button pictures can be secured for five cents. The larger sizes cost ten cents, while photos on a postal card, which is a new and novel idea, can also be secured for a dime. Mr. Peckham is the originator of the camera and the process which he uses in taking these pictures. The camera will take over 4,000 exposures without recharging. He does away with the dark room, and his work presents a decidedly artistic appearance. An electric light has been provided and he can take pictures in the night time, or in dark, cloudy weather, as well as in the day. The big store is to be congratulated upon securing his services, which will be much appreciated by patrons. He will be found on the third floor front. He requires two days in which to finish the work after a sitting.
