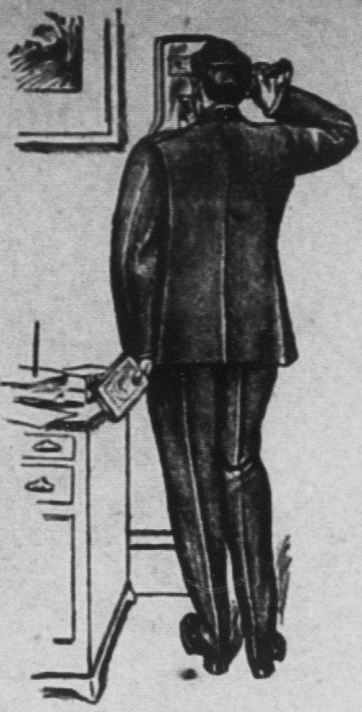

**TOWANDA'S FOND  
DREAM SHATTERED**

**Practical Assurance Given That  
Lehigh Will Build New Bridge  
at That Place, but it Will be  
of Little Benefit to Residents  
of the Town**

For several years the Business Men's association of Towanda has been endeavoring to induce the officials of the Lehigh Valley to change the course of the road at that place and erect a passenger station at a point which would be convenient to the residents as well as to the people who are compelled to go in and out of town. Every one in this section is familiar with the present location of the Lehigh station at Towanda, and therefore it is unnecessary to go into details. A committee appointed by the Towanda Business Men's association has held several interviews with the Lehigh officials. The latter were requested to erect a station at the foot of either Park street or Mix avenue. Either of these points was considered to be a central location, but there was more than simply building the station involved in the request. It would have been necessary also for the company to run the main tracks down the west side of the Susquehanna river for a distance of nearly a mile, and then cross the stream. Doing this would mean the abandonment of the old bridge and the erection of a new one. It would also mean raising the grade at least 17 feet to meet the grade on the east side of the river. The project involved the expenditure of at least \$250,000, to say nothing of the purchase of the necessary land on which to build the road over the proposed route. Property owners asked high prices and the company hesitated. The matter has thus been pending for some years and the committee has been unable to get a direct reply. At times it has looked as if the company might be induced to grant the proposed change, but recent developments appear to have shattered every hope and it now seems as if this wish of the residents of Towanda will never be realized.

Within the past day or two enough has become known to give almost positive assurance that the Lehigh officials have made entirely different plans for the residents of Towanda so far as railroad matters and passenger stations are concerned.

The latest rumor, while not bearing the stamp of official approval, carries every semblance of truth and it is to the effect that plans have already been made and approved for a new bridge and a change in the route at Towanda, but it is an entirely different proposition from that presented by the committee representing the Business Men's association. According to a reliable informant the Lehigh has decided to build a new bridge at Towanda to take the place of the old one.

The new structure will be considerably longer than the present one, and will cross the river in such a manner as to do away with the sharp curve at both ends. The new bridge will start at a point some distance north of the upper Towanda station and will extend to the east side of the river to where the east end of the old bridge stands, thus connecting with the main tracks. By constructing the bridge in this manner the heavy curves will be practically eliminated, and the company will have a comparatively straight track over a section of the route which has long been a source of annoyance.

The change in the route will of necessity require a change to be made in the passenger station. The present station at upper Towanda will be abandoned, as the company will have no further use for it. Just where it will be located has not as yet been definitely determined. At the present time the company is considering two locations. One location is near the place where the East Towanda station now stands and the other is

at a point nearly a half mile north of the upper Towanda depot. So far the chances are said to be in favor of East Towanda. The location of the station at the latter place would be a slight crumb of satisfaction to many of the residents of Towanda, as in some respects it would be much more convenient to reach than one located at the upper end of the town.

It is said that the decision of the Lehigh is based on the fact that the property owners asked prohibitive prices for land over which the requested route would of necessity pass. It is also said that the Lehigh has never looked upon the county seat as a paying proposition and that there were no prospects of receiving enough out of the town to warrant the expenditure of the money necessary to grant the request made by the Towanda business men.

**RECOVERED LOOT**

Over \$3,000 worth of goods were stolen from the wrecked cars at Falls on November 3. Before the company officials arrived on the scene of the wreck people residing in the vicinity of Falls began looting the wreckage. Special Officer J. J. Johnson of this division went to work on the case and has succeeded in recovering nearly \$2,000 worth of the stolen property. In order to do so he caused the arrest of a dozen or more, many of whom were prominent people. Yesterday's Hazleton papers commended the officer in glowing terms for the work he has done in connection with recovering the property.

**FIRE BOARD MEETING**

There will be a meeting of the fire board on Friday evening and the secretaries of the various fire companies are requested to hand in their yearly reports. This is a most important matter especially so far as it concerns the standing of the members of the fire department. Only those who are in good standing can vote at the department election and if a company is not reported by the secretary the members of such company will not be entitled to vote.

**TORN DOWN BILLS**

Members of the local foot ball team are complaining of the fact that the bills which were posted about town last night to advertise tomorrow's game were torn down by some miscreant whose identity is unknown. They have a strong suspicion, however, who did the disreputable deed, and may call them to account.

A dance will be given in the Movanho club rooms this evening. The Packer band will furnish the music, which will consist of a number of new and up to date waltzes and two steps. The indications are that a large crowd will be in attendance.

**SECRETARIES SHOULD  
MAKE THEIR REPORTS**

**Members of the Fire Department  
Not Reported in Good Standing  
Will Not Be Allowed to Vote  
at Annual Election**

A meeting of the Firemen's Relief association was held in the Packer hose rooms last night. The members of the fire board had been requested to meet with the association but as the former failed to show up matters of joint interest were not disposed of.

During the meeting, however, it developed that the secretaries of the various fire companies have not as yet reported to the fire board the standing of the members. This is an important matter and the secretaries should attend to it at once. The rules provide that only members in good standing are entitled to vote at the department election which will occur on the first of the coming year. This report should be made so as to be handed in at the regular meeting of the borough council which will be held on Monday evening next. Secretaries who fail to make this report will bar their companies from participating in the election.

Section men have been at work for several days extending a track on the Lehigh at Mauch Chunk, which when completed will give the company four tracks around the Bear Mountain curve opposite the town. This will also extend one of the Packerton yard tracks to a point near the Mauch Chunk passenger station.

**TOMORROW'S GAME  
WILL BE RED HOT**

**Both Teams Have Been Materially  
Strengthened and An  
Exciting Contest is Assured**

The game of foot ball which is to be played on the driving park grounds at Athens tomorrow afternoon will be attended by a large crowd. The game will be hot from the call of time to the finish.

The Elmira team has been materially strengthened by the addition of several good ones and the team will put up one of the strongest games of the season. The Sayre-Athens players are in fine fettle. Hours have been spent in getting the men in condition and the Elmira bunch will be given the time of their lives.

The management has decided to change the price of admission from 50 cents to 25 cents. The contract calls for a large guarantee to Elmira and for this reason the price was originally placed at 50 cents, but owing to the fact that there has been some dissatisfaction among the patrons the price has been reduced to 25 cents for ladies and gentlemen.

The game will be called at 2:30 o'clock and the Sayre-Athens team will line up as follows: Morgan, Brillhart, Schenck, White, Hoag, Purcell, Gallinger, Dwyer, Warren, Shannon, M. Downs, W. Downs, O'Shea, Campbell and Seddon.

Arrangements have been made to play the All Ithaca team at Percy field at Ithaca on Saturday next. While the Ithaca team has fine material to select from the Athens Sayre management will put a strong team against them and we have no doubt that they will defend their title of champions. Excepting Dwyer the lineup against Ithaca will be the same as against Elmira and is one of the strongest athletic teams in the state of Pennsylvania. They leave for Ithaca at 11:30 a. m., returning at 11:15 p. m.
