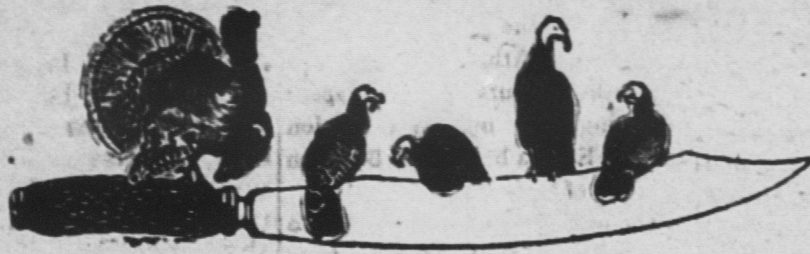

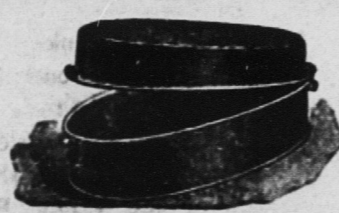

KAISER OPENS REICHSTAG.

"Is Highly Satisfied in Support Roosevelt's Efforts for Peace."

BERLIN, Nov. 29.—Emperor William opened the reichstag in the white hall of the palace, himself reading the speech from the throne. The latter was occupied chiefly with domestic affairs. Turning near the close of the speech to foreign affairs, the emperor said:

"The German empire has with all powers correct and with most of them good and friendly relations. It filled me with high satisfaction that I was able to support the successful efforts of the president of the United States in bringing about peace between his majesty the emperor of Russia and his majesty the emperor of Japan."

"I greet Japan's entrance into the ranks of the great powers with sincere wishes for the peaceable, civilizing mission of this highly endowed people, and my lively sympathies attend the efforts which the neighboring friendly Russian empire is making toward a new order of things in its internal affairs. I hope that his majesty the Emperor Nicholas may earn the love and gratitude of his people as the pathfinder of Russia's happy future."

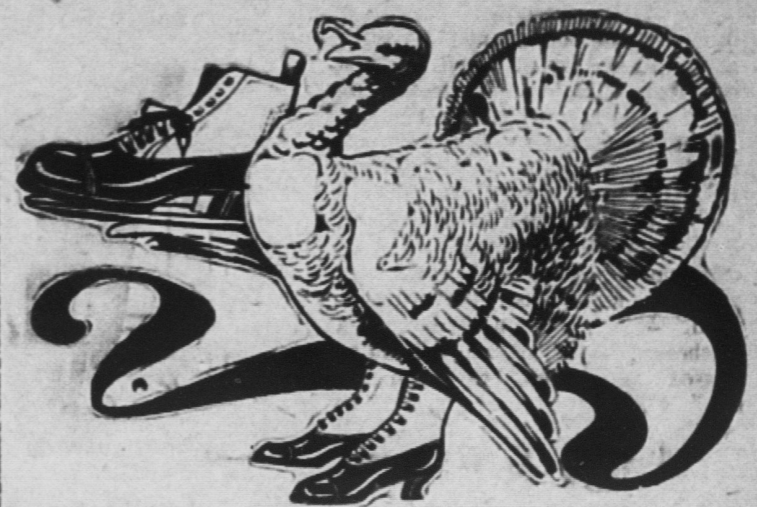
His majesty also expressed his congratulations to Norway's government and people upon the election of "the royal couple to whom I am bound by friendly sentiments."
