Meriwether Court Martial Ends.
ANNAPOLIS, Md., Dec. 1.—Except for the announcement of the verdict after it shall have been passed upon by the secretary of the navy, the Meriwether court martial in so far as the public is concerned is at an end. The session was almost wholly given over to arguments of counsel before the court which is trying Midshipman Meriwether on charges, the most serious of which is manslaughter in connection with the death of Midshipman James R. Branch, Jr., after a fist fight in which he and Meriwether engaged. James M. Munroe and Lieutenant Commander John K. Hobson spoke in defense of the accused and Judge Advocate Maris and District Attorney John C. Rose for the prosecution. At the conclusion of the address of Mr. Rose the court was cleared and consideration of the verdict began.

Americans at Berlin Celebrate.
BERLIN, Dec. 1.—Three hundred Americans celebrated Thanksgiving day at a banquet at the Kaiserhof last night. E. Percival Dodge, secretary of the American embassy, presided. Dr. Francis Greenwood Peabody of Harvard university made the principal address. A telegram of greeting was sent to President Roosevelt. The banquet was followed by a dance.
