

**FELL THIRTY FEET  
FROM SCAFFOLD**

Landed Head First on Concrete Floor and Still Lives to Tell the Tale

Just before noon today C. L. Wilgus, an electrician employed by the Lehigh Valley, fell from a scaffold in the paint shops to the concrete floor, a distance of over 30 feet, and despite the fact that he landed on his head he still lives to tell the tale, and his physician says that he will be able to resume work in a few days.

Wilgus and companion were engaged in stringing electric wires in the paint shop. A scaffold had been erected for this purpose. Wilgus was on one end of the scaffold when he reached out over the edge to adjust a wire. He was seen to totter for a moment, and then losing his equilibrium plunged head downward to the concrete floor beneath, landing on his head and shoulders. When picked up he was in an unconscious condition and was bleeding profusely from an ugly wound in the back of his head. A stretcher was procured and he was taken to his room at McCauley's boarding house on North Elmer avenue. Dr. Cummings was summoned and found that the injured man was suffering from concussion of the brain and a compound laceration of the scalp. Four stitches were required to close the wound in his head. The doctor says that he will be all right in a few days, but is forced to admit that the man's escape from instant death is little short of a miracle.

**GUM MACHINE FOUND**

The battered and broken remains of the penny-in-the-slot gum machine which was stolen from the outside of the Pullman cafe some time ago were found this morning concealed in the corner of a Lehigh Valley box car which had been standing unused on a sidetrack in the yards. The thieves had evidently taken the machine to the car and there broke it open, confiscating the pennies it contained.

**MANY VALUABLE  
RELICS UNEARTHED**

Interesting Archaeological Discoveries in the Ancient City of Visby

(The following account of an important discovery in Sweden is from the pen of Mrs. Charles H. Graves, wife of the American minister to that country, and will be read with great interest by patrons of The Valley Record.)

Editor Valley Record:

One of the most interesting archaeological discoveries of the time occurred in the ancient city of Visby on the Island of Gotland, which is a plateau of limestone lying in the middle of the Baltic sea, and a Swedish possession.

This old city figured conspicuously in the history of the eleventh, twelfth and thirteenth centuries when it was a rich commercial center and held a position in northern Europe like that of London today. It was the mother of the Hanseatic League formed by the rich merchants, twelve thousand in number, it is said, who controlled the trade between the north and east. They built a great wall about their city, thirty feet high, battlemented with towers about two hundred feet apart. The wall is about four thousand, three hundred and seventy yards long.

King: coveted this "Queen of the Baltic" or "Eye of the Baltic" as it was called, and many severe attacks were made upon its walls which proved entirely impregnable. In 1361 Valdemar, King of Denmark, landed a large army on the coast and the proud burgers of Visby, conceited and rash, made the mistake of leaving their stronghold and going out to crush the invaders. They met with overwhelming defeat and their city was captured.

Six years after the discovery of America the new route to India around Cape Good Hope cut Visby out of the main road of trade, and today, while she is dead to commerce she still holds her queenship in the world of art and beauty. Nowhere may one find an old walled city in a better state of preservation.

Upon our visit to this interesting place we were much impressed with the dignity of that old wall, which though fallen and crumbling in places, had withstood the ravages of war and of time to a most remarkable degree, and in its extreme old age had found a use; for clinging tenderly to its old sides, and clambering over it in all directions were green vines, and wild roses that bloom their prettiest within its shelter. We walked through quaint narrow streets with tiny low houses; then visited the ruins of seventeen churches that had been built in the days of Visby's grandeur. The roofless walls still retain their lines of architectural beauty and pretty green things grow in their crannies and niches, while a little tree shoots up straight and steady from the tower of Saint Lars.

Standing within the grass grown nave and transepts of these old stone churches one feels a sense of reverence for the grand old walls that have looked upon the passing of eight centuries and still possess such lines of strength and beauty.

Many valuable antiquities have been unearthed at Visby, old iron, boxes of jewels and gold and old Roman coins. But the most interesting discovery of all came most unexpectedly when some workmen were digging a cellar recently outside the city wall. They came first upon some human bones and then upon weapons of ancient warfare, whereupon they sent for the archaeologists, who began a careful exhumation of what proved to be the burying ground of warriors who fell in the battle of Valdemar in the year 1361. Looking down into this opened grave one sees a large number of black chain armors of the early centuries, and shining through them like silver, the white bones of their wearers, the skeleton only remaining of what was there committed to the dust, while all about are strewn

ancient weapons of war. Closer examination enables one to see the wound marks on the skulls; here is one who was killed by the stroke of a battle axe that made a clean cut right through the chain mail into the skull four or five inches deep. And there is the mark of the spiked hammer that crushed through the skull, leaving a jagged hole. Some parts of the armored breastplates are so rusted that upon attempt to remove them they fell apart while the skeleton bones within remain firm and white. These valuable heirlooms of the past will be carefully preserved in the museum at Visby, adding to the riches which do not attract the cupidity of kings but the interest of the world. A. K. G.
