COUNCIL HELD MONTHLY MEETING

Borough Daddies Considered Many Matters of Importance

Athens—The regular monthly meeting of the borough council was held last evening with the following members present: President Weller, Keefe, Tripp, Macafee and Weiss.

The first matter under consideration was the complaint of the residents in the vicinity of the Imperial Tool Works in regard to the soot that filled the air and settled about the houses when they blew out the flues. Mr. Tripp, one of the committee, stated that in an interview with the company they had promised to attend to the matter. Mr. Phelps suggested putting up a weather vane and watch the wind and only blow off the soot when the air would turn it in the opposite direction. The council followed with a lengthy discussion closing with no definite action.

The next discussion was over the gas company's contaminations. Mr. Gillette stated that a new apparatus was being installed to consume all of the impurities from their works, but the work was delayed until the arrival of an inspector. There was the prevailing opinion in the minds of the councilmen that their statements were only excuses for delay and the matter was put over for another meeting, in the meantime the committee will insist upon prompt action.

Councilman Weiss on the proposed light asked for on South Elmira street was not ready to report and was granted further time.

A large number of bills were approved and ordered paid.

Chief Mulligan stated that the trolley company had repaired the joints on their tracks.

Mr. Tripp then reported that in the repairs to No. 3 hose house there was no provision for lighting it and that some action ought to be taken at once. In conversation with officials of the electric light company he was of the opinion that they were demanding an exorbitant price for wiring, and he asked for instructions as to what to do. After some discussion as to the propriety of piping for gas or wiring for electricity a vote was taken and the committee was instructed to go ahead with the wiring for electric light.

Street Commissioner Mulligan stated that George R. Hill desired to know what would be done about accepting Locust street. No action was taken.

It was decided to insure No. 3 hose house for \$1,200.

Borough Attorney Mills announced the fact that the arbitrators in the McMorran case had made an amicable agreement to pay Mrs. McMorran \$75 damages in settlement of her claim. The council voted to accept the terms and voted an order for the amount.

There was a prolonged discussion in regard to the lawless persons who had been forcing an entrance into No. 3 hose house at different times and doing damage to the work before it was accepted by the borough. The matter had already subjected the borough to expense and Burgess Macafee was instructed to reprimand the guilty persons.

SCHOOL BOARD MEETING

Athens—The regular meeting of the School Board was held last evening with all of the directors present. There was no business but the regular routine with the exception that Miss Maud Dugan of Ulster, was elected to teach the Fifth A and Sixth B grade in place of Miss Lundie, resigned. The bills for the term up to the present time were presented and ordered paid.
