FOR THE OPEN DEAL.

Cheate Says New York Is Proud of Its Business Men.

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—Joseph H. Choate, former ambassador to Great Britain, said at the bankers' banquet at the Waldorf-Astoria:

"I am very proud of my country and of this city of New York, and nothing is more dear to me than her honor and credit. And yet, after looking through my morning papers and seeing the carnival of recrimination that is now daily going on, there were times when it didn't look like a city to be proud of. "I hope these examinations will go on until everything has been brought into the clear light of day and has been made plain, and it must be a pleasure to every one of us to note, as I have done, that all this trouble hardly casts a shadow on the integrity and good faith of the great business interests which make this imperial city what it is."

"Look at the men at the head of our banks; see how the enormous transactions of the Stock Exchange are conducted solely on honor, and it must be manifest as the sun in the heavens that New York is justly proud of itself and is as proud of its men of business as any city in the world."
