KANE BANKRUPT MATTER SETTLED

Suit in Which Sayre Parties Were Interested Amicably Adjusted at Towanda This Morning

The suit in which A. E. Allyn, as trustee of the bankrupt estate of Michael Kane, was plaintiff and the National Bank of Sayre defendant, which was to have come up for trial before Judge Fanning and a jury at Towanda today, was settled out of court. The terms of settlement are not known but it is understood that an adjustment was made satisfactory to all parties concerned.

The case grew out of a transaction which occurred just previous to Kane being forced into bankruptcy some four years ago. It appears that a few days before the petition was filed Kane sold certain notes to the amount of \$2200 held by the National Bank of Sayre. A. E. Allyn, one of the creditors of the bankrupt, and who was afterward appointed trustee, claimed that under the bankrupt law Kane had no right to dispose of his property, knowing that he was insolvent, and then virtually make a preferred creditor of the bank. Had the case gone to trial it is a mooted question what the outcome would have been. While the law is quite clear in the subject it doubtless would have been an exceedingly difficult matter to furnish proof that the bankrupt liquidated the notes knowing that he was insolvent.

HE WENT TO SLEEP

One night last week there was an entertainment at one of the churches in Sayre which was attended by quite a large party of young people. Among the number was a young man who had accompanied a certain young lady to the church. During the course of the evening the young man mentioned was missed and as the hour for going home approached a diligent search was made for him, it being known almost to a certainty that he had not left the church. Every nook and corner in the church edifice was carefully looked into but despite the fact that nearly everyone in attendance took a hand in the search the efforts were unsuccessful and the young woman was forced to go home without her male escort.

Several of the party, confident that the object of their search was in the building somewhere, continued to look about. Presently one of them peeked behind the piano, and there sitting in the corner, sweetly sleeping like a babe in its mother's arms, was the missing young man. He was gently aroused and told that the entertainment was over and that the greater part of those in attendance had gone home, including the young lady whom he had accompanied. It is said that then and there he resolved that hereafter he would take a nap in the afternoon previous to being out at night.

FELL INTO VAT OF BOILING LIQUID

E. B. Gilbert Met With Fatal Accident at Greenwood—Has Relatives Residing in Sayre

E. B. Gilbert, father of Harry Gilbert and Mrs. Albert Billings of this place, while working in the tannery at Greenwood Sunday night fell into a vat of boiling liquid and was so badly scalded that he died of his injuries at about 2 o'clock this morning.

Mr. Gilbert was a night workman at the tannery and there were several persons near him at the time of the accident, who rescued him at once. His injuries at the time were not considered dangerous but he gradually grew worse until the hour of his death this morning.

The funeral will take place on Wednesday at 2 o'clock. He is survived by a large family, Harry and Mrs. Billings of Sayre and Charles of Binghamton, besides those who reside at home. Mr. Gilbert's father, Norman Gilbert, was a very prominent man in Bradford county.

PAINFULLY INJURED

Worrell D. Andrews, who resides at 103 Draper street, met with a painful injury while working at the shops yesterday. Assisted by a companion he was engaged in driving nails in a ceiling when the hammer he was using slipped and his hand struck a big sliver which entered the middle finger of the left hand. The sliver was driven into the member lengthwise and caused an ugly looking wound of considerable length. He went to the hospital where the foreign body was removed.

DIDN'T STAY LONG

Mr. Hockslider, formerly train distributor on the D. S. & S., who came to Sayre yesterday to accept a similar situation with the Lehigh at this place, worked one day and resigned. Mr. Hockslider is alleged to have said that the work was so radically different from that to which he had been accustomed that he didn't believe he cared for the job. TOWANDA'S LOSS IS WAVERLY'S GAIN

The House of Heeman Migrates From the County Seat to the New York State Town

Lyman Heeman, Sr., his estimable wife, Mr. and Mrs. Francis Heeman, and Fred Heeman and Harry Heeman have decided to remove from Towanda to Waverly and anyone who desires to communicate with them will hereafter find them at the latter address. The decision of the Heemans will not be regretted by the residents of Towanda and the police in that town will be particularly well pleased. Recently Officer Guy Hollon made some rather uncomplimentary remarks concerning the Heemans, two of whom were in court charged with petty thievery. The officer stated that the family had absolutely the worst record of any in that section. It appears, however, that the members of the family took umbrage at the officer's opinion. In fact they flared up and got mad, and in their madness declared that they would not live in Towanda any longer. They determined to migrate to Waverly, but unless they mend their ways they will not fare any better in the New York state town than they did at the county seat. The Waverly police are eternally vigilant and have an excellent facility for rounding up chicken and clothes line thieves. It behooves the house of Heeman to turn over a new leaf and do it quickly.

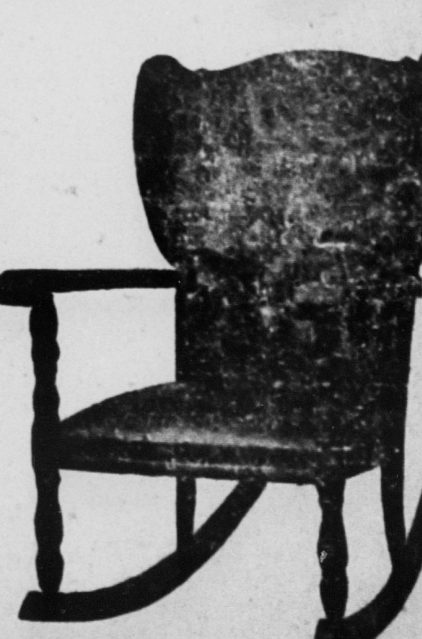
