NOWLES WANTED FOR HORSE STEALING

Left Towanda Yesterday With Rig, Passed Through Sayre and Was Last Seen Headed For Elmira

Wick Nowles, a young man about 20 years old, is badly wanted by the Towanda police authorities for horse stealing, and if the efforts which were made for his capture yesterday are successful Nowles will be in custody by the time this copy of the Record is in the hands of its readers. Early yesterday morning Chief Walsh, of this place, received a telephone call from officer Guy Hollon of Towanda, stating that Nowles had stolen a team of horses and a wagon in that place, and when last seen was headed for Sayre. He was accompanied by a young woman, said to be one of the Heeman tribe, and also a little child. As Nowles was known to have an uncle residing in South Waverly near the state line, the chief at once went to the place and while there ascertained that the man he was after had arrived there ahead of him and had stopped only a short time. The chief also learned that Nowles had secured a pair of thills and turned one of the animals loose, so that when he arrived in South Waverly he was only driving one horse.

From South Waverly Nowles headed toward Elmira and the police of that city were notified to be on the lookout for him.

The animals stolen by Nowles were old and of little value, but as horse stealing is a serious crime even in the cete east, Nowles will doubtless do a long term of service for the Commonwealth if captured and convicted.

LITCHFIELD WOMAN DEAD

Mrs. Frank Miller, a resident of Litchfield, died at the home of Mrs. Mary Albright, of Hawley street, Binghamton, yesterday, while undergoing Christian Science treatment. Six months ago she underwent an operation at the Packer hospital in this place. She was suffering from cancer, and after being discharged she went to Binghamton and embraced the Christian Science faith. The treatment was a failure and Mrs. Miller died as above stated. The coroner was notified but as the deceased was 21 years of age he decided that she had a perfect right to employ any means of treatment that she chose. The coroner issued a death certificate.

FELL FROM BRIDGE, FRACTURED HIP

Omar Dimmock, a Cripple, Meets With An Unfortunate Accident While Working For the Lehigh Yesterday

Omar Dimmock, a Lehigh Valley employe, is lying on a cot in the Packer hospital suffering from a broken hip which he sustained yesterday afternoon in falling from a foot bridge which crosses a gully at Shields, a small station two miles east of VanEtten. Dimmock lost a leg several years ago in a railway accident, and since then has been compelled to use a pegger. Recently he has been employed at a pumping station situated a few hundred feet from the Lehigh tracks at Shields. In order to get from the tracks to the pumping station it was necessary for him to pass over a plank bridge. In so doing he slipped and fell to the ground beneath, a distance of several feet. When picked up he was found to have sustained a fracture of the right hip. He was placed on board an engine and brought to the hospital at this place.

CHRISTMAS MAIL

The members of the local post-office force are beginning to feel the effects of the annual flood of yuletide mail. The mail handled during the Christmas season is many times greater than at other stated periods of the year. While it is usually not of a weighty nature it is very bulky and consists of many large boxes and packages some of which are two or more feet in length. By the middle of this week the Christmas rush, so far as mail is concerned, will be at its height, and the clerks and carriers will have their hands full in delivering it. Residents of Sayre who depend upon the carriers for mail service should be patient and not kick. The carrier is having his troubles this week, and if he makes mistakes remember that they are mistakes of the head and not of the heart.

The funeral of Helen A. Terry, whose death occurred Sunday morning last, was held last night at 7 o'clock at her father's home at No. 610 Desmond street, the Rev. J. F. Warner, pastor of the Methodist church, officiating. Appropriate selections were rendered by Mrs. J. H. Price and Mrs. Robert Williams. The pall bearers were the Misses Ruth Carpenter, Martha Fox, Bertha Adams and Grace Connor. The casket was covered with beautiful flowers, tokens of the esteem in which she was held by her young friends. The remains were taken to Tunkhannock this morning for burial.

RECEIVED HEAVY SENTENCE

Woodruff, the man who was arrested at East Troy on Saturday, charged by the police authorities of Towanda with having burglarized several residences in that place, and who when taken into custody gave a full and free confession, was sentenced yesterday by Judge Fanning to seven years in the Eastern Penitentiary and to pay a fine of \$100. Woodruff took the stiff sentence with a smile. He is unmarried and was recently released from the prison at Auburn, N. Y., having served a three years' sentence for house breaking.

WHAT HAS BECOME OF SPITTING LAW?

Local Physician Seeks Information Concerning Borough Ordinance Which He Says Is Being Flagrantly Violated

The Record is in receipt of the following query from a well known local physician, regarding the anti-spitting ordinance which was adopted by the borough council a year ago last summer:

"What has become of the ordinance prohibiting expectoration on the sidewalks and other public places? Beautiful stores, a credit to Sayre; but outside filthy streets, littered with expectoration, a disgrace to Sayre. Is this commendable law to become obsolete? There are enough tubercular bacilli and other disease producing germs thus thrown upon the pavement, to be gathered up by shoes and clothing and carried to the homes to menace the health of the entire community. Post the notices as they were originally and then make an example of a few offenders, and the nuisance will soon be abated."

So far as the ordinance itself is concerned The Record presumes that it has been assigned its proper place in the borough archives, and while it is too young to be called a dead letter the fact remains that there has never been a single arrest made under its provision. The police can hardly be blamed in the matter, however, as persons who use the sidewalks and various hallways about town for cuspidors are not in the habit of expectorating in the presence of the guardians of the peace. Unless the police are witnesses to the act they are powerless to make arrests; and as private citizens who doubtless many times see men and boys expectorate upon the walks do not care to enter complaint, the violators of the ordinance are guaranteed almost absolute immunity from arrest and conviction.

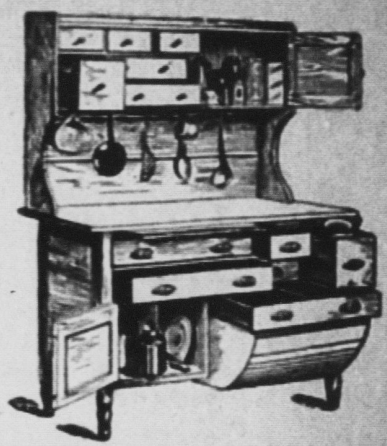
HOSPITAL NOTES

WILL ERECT A NEW DEPOT AT HAZLETON

Lehigh Valley Officials Grant the Request of the Citizens of That Place--Other Railroad Notes

The citizens and business men of Hazleton are rejoicing over the fact that the Lehigh Valley is to commence the erection of a new depot at that place. For three or four years the Business Men's association has been fighting for a station and the meantime they have been confronted with apathy on the part of the officials of the company which looked almost like refusal. On Saturday last, however, general manager M. B. Cutter announced that a new station would be built. It will probably be three stories high and contain room enough to accommodate the clerks and transact other necessary business. No details as to size has been given out, but the officials have assured the people of Hazleton that the structure will be a fine one and one which will in every way be a credit to Hazleton.

Every available crew was pressed into service Saturday and yesterday to relieve the congested coal traffic. On account of a number of wrecks which occurred at various points on the line last week coal trains were blocked, and the trainmen have for the most part been compelled to work night and day. At Coxtton the yards were badly congested and it took hours to clear the tracks.

Edward Fowler, the Lehigh Valley engineer who was injured at the lumber yards in Hazleton some weeks ago, has recovered and is once more able to handle the throttle.

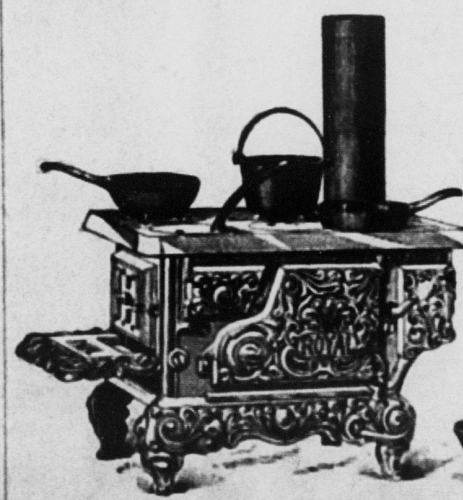
