A ROUGH SURGEON.

Captain Chubb saves a Chinese Life on the High Seas. NEW YORK, Dec. 26.—Captain Chubb of the steamship Satsuma, in port from Yokohama, is very much worried because owing to a rough but effective surgical operation he and the chief engineer performed on one of the Chinese sailors on the voyage he owns the sailor and all his earthly possessions, including wife and children in Hongkong. This sailor is Ling Hop. When the voyage was about half over Ling Hop became very sick. He lay down on the deck to die. The other Chinese did not interfere. It appears that in the province from which they all come there is a custom that if a man saves another from death the rescued one and all his possessions and family become the property of the rescuer. None of the other Chinese wanted to assume Ling Hop's family, so they all stolidly let him alone. Captain Chubb took Ling Hop into his cabin and called the chief engineer into consultation. They found on Ling Hop's left side a strange, unnatural growth as large as a baseball. This seemed to be what ailed Ling Hop. They decided to cut it off. Ling had neither objection nor consent. They had no surgical implements, but they found a large pair of tin shears. These they sharpened as keenly as they could. Ling Hop was soaked with a carbolic acid solution for an antiseptic, and the captain snipped off the strange thing on Ling Hop's side. It was then cauterized with a soldering iron. The captain swears this is true. In a week Ling Hop was as well as ever, but now considers himself Captain Chubb's property for life.
