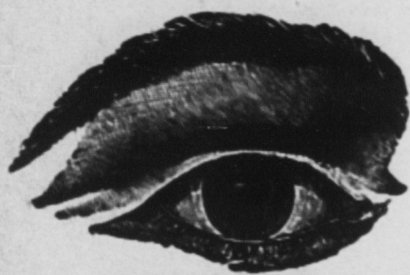

### BAR "BIDS" AND "OFFERS."

Chicago Board of Trade Caut Brokers From Their Building.

CHICAGO, Dec. 28.—The board of trade frowned upon the trading in "bids" and "offers," which have been adopted as substitutes for "puts" and "calls" since those privileges were abolished. The trading in "bids" and "offers" has been conducted in the smoking room of the board of trade building after the close of the regular market.

When a crowd of brokers attempted to enter the room they found their way barred by a number of ushers, who informed them that the real estate committee of the board had decided that there will be no more trading in "bids" and "offers" in the board of trade building. A large crowd of brokers immediately went to the rear of the building, where the trade was begun in and around the rear door on the first floor. The ushers again compelled them to move, and finally the dealers in "bids" and "offers" hastened across the street and rented a vacant room on La Salle street, within a few minutes' walk of the board of trade building, where they resumed their trading.

President Jackson of the board of trade said: "We simply deemed it advisable to discontinue the trading in this building until action has been taken by the courts defining 'bids' and 'offers.' The action taken does not mean that the board has definitely decided to abandon the trading."

### Bullets and Balloons.

In the course of an interview with a representative of the Paris Mail, M. Julliot, the engineer of M. Lebaudy's balloon, declared that a balloon could scarcely be injured by rifle fire. Two hundred bullets through the silk would only slightly diminish the balloon's powers of ascension, while its exceedingly mobile properties would render the possibility of disablement by shell fire exceedingly problematical. But should it be seriously rent the aeronauts would probably be able to reach friendly territory in safety before the final collapse.

### Farmer's Invention.

A Canadian farmer has rigged up a novel device to keep his cows out of the corn. A framework of light poles is strapped over the cow's nose, muzzle fashion, and studded with large nails. When the cow tries to get through the fence the nails catch against the bars and effectually keep her out of the grain. The device has been widely copied by the farmers in that section of Canada where the fences are at best but poor, and travelers can see scores of cattle carrying these novel headgears, often with birds roosting on them.

The oyster is not much larger than the head of a fair-sized pin at the end of a fortnight, and at three months about equal to a split pea. At the end of four years' growth it is fit for the market. Oysters live to the age of from 12 to 15 years. According to one naturalist, these bivalves feed on muds—(the most minute form of marine life).
