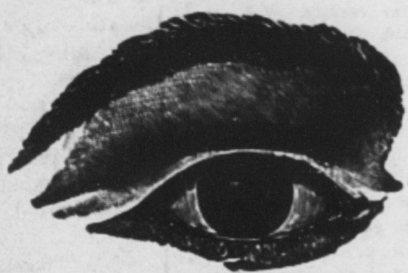

BOGUS COIN MAN'S TRIAL TOMORROW

Large Number of Sayre Witnesses Have Been Notified to Attend

Fred J. Leonard, a United States marshal of Coudersport, Potter county, was here yesterday subpoenaing witnesses in the case of the United States Government against George H. Smith. Smith is one of the men who it is alleged passed a number of spurious coins in Sayre early last fall. The coins were bad imitations of silver quarters and were easily detected.

Smith was captured at Moravia, N. Y., a short time after his visit to Sayre. Two companions were with him, but they managed to escape and are still at large. His trial will begin in the United States court at Utica tomorrow. The Sayre witnesses who have been summoned to appear against Smith tomorrow are James Walsh, John W. Rowland, Josh White, James W. Brown and A. Barner.
