AT YERKES' GRAVE.

Nephew of Millionaire Not Allowed to Attend Funeral.

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—Braving armed guards, who threatened to shoot any stranger who attempted to enter the Yerkes mansion, at Fifth avenue and Sixty-eighth street, Charles Yerkes, a Pennsylvania nephew of the traction millionaire, unsuccessfully sought admittance to the house while the funeral services over the body of Charles T. Yerkes were in progress.

Later young Yerkes created a scene at the gate of Greenwood cemetery, attempting to pass the guards there to make his way to the Yerkes mausoleum, where the body of the millionaire was interred. He was not allowed to enter the cemetery, however, and returned to New York.

Before this sensational incident occurred further light was thrown on the romantic career of Yerkes and of the beautiful Emilie Grigby by Mrs. James P. Kernochan and Mrs. Stuyvesant Fish, leaders of the Four Hundred, who went abroad on the same steamship with Miss Grigby two years ago.

Mrs. Kernochan was warm in her praise of the beautiful young woman and denounced as cruel slanders the stories about her.

"She is a dear, good, sweet girl," declared the society leader impulsively. "Why, she is like a convent girl—quiet, refined and educated."

Mrs. Kernochan said she met Miss Grigby in Liverpool, but neither she nor Mrs. Fish met her in Paris, nor did they eat a strawberry luncheon with her, with strawberries at \$90 a box. Mrs. Fish praised the girl's beauty, but declared that they had never met.

NEW HAVEN ROAD ACCUSED.

Transportation Company's Petition Charges Various Discriminations.

BOSTON, Jan. 2.—Discrimination on the part of the New York, New Haven and Hartford railroad is charged in a petition filed with the railroad commissioners here by the Enterprise Transportation company.

The petition alleges that unnecessary annoyance and delay has been caused the public by the refusal of the railroad company to accept and honor baggage checks issued by the transportation company and to allow the porters of the petitioning company to get baggage upon its arrival in Fall River and that the railroad company has established a fare of \$2 for passengers between New York and Boston via the Old Colony Steamboat company's line and a fare of \$1.50 between New York and Fall River, making the fare between Fall River and Boston via the Old Colony Steamboat company 50 cents, while the fare charged via the Enterprise Transportation company between Fall River and Boston is \$1.20.

The petitioner considers this unfair and unreasonable and a prima facie evidence of discrimination. The company asks the commissioners to compel the railroad company to honor the baggage checks of the transportation company and to recommend that the fare between Fall River and Boston be reduced to 50 cents or as much below \$1.20 as they may deem advisable.

Murder at Morsmere. RIDGEFIELD, N. J., Jan. 2.—The body of a murdered man was found at Morsmere, a village near this place, at the foot of the Palisades, by boys who were walking along the base of the cliffs. Coroner Lees of Ridgefield Park took charge of the body. An examination showed that the man's throat had been pierced by some sharp weapon, probably a stiletto.
