PITTSBURGH, Jan. 3.—Hyde J. Summers, formerly of Pittsburgh, now of Olean, N. Y., has begun proceedings to annul his marriage, alleging he led the wrong girl to the altar. Summers says he offered himself in marriage to Ruth Bekman and was accepted. Ruth, the complainant says, had a twin sister named Irene, and the two were identical in appearance. Several days after the wedding, Summers says, he requested his wife to play the piano and sing for him. She played indifferently, he alleges, and could not sing. This aroused his suspicions, as he knew that Ruth possessed a clear soprano voice. On this statement he seeks to prove his wife is Irene and not Ruth. The defendant denies any error has been made and declares she can sing with ability. The whole case will pivot on this point. Summers cites instances when Irene accompanied him to a theater in Buffalo as a joke, he believing she was Ruth. DECISION FOR JESUITS. Catholic Mission's Cattle Saved by Supreme Court Order. WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—The supreme court of the United States, through Justice Peckham, has affirmed the decision of the United States circuit court of the district of Montana in refusing to take jurisdiction in the case of the Montana Catholic mission versus Missoula county, Mont. The Catholic mission is a corporation which holds the property of the Jesuit fathers in Montana, including a large herd of cattle held on the Flathead Indian reservation in Missoula county, and this proceeding arose out of an effort on the part of the county authorities to take the cattle. The mission association contended that authority to run the cattle on the reservation had been given by the Indians and by the federal government and that the object in holding them there was purely charitable. MAN NOT BURNED HER HATCHET. HOUSTON, Tex., Jan. 3.—Mrs. Carrie Nation continued her "joint smashing" crusade and made assaults on several persons. She was ejected from one by physical force. At another a door was slammed on her and locked, catching her skirt and holding her prisoner until she released herself by industriously wielding her hatchet. The police have decided to arrest her and have her incarcerated on an insanity charge, and her incarceration may be expected to follow soon. BOY KILLED IN TOY AUTOMOBILE. FLORAL PARK, N. Y., Jan. 8.—While coasting down hill in a toy automobile given as a Christmas present two little boys were run down by a big automobile. One of them was killed instantly and the other was injured, perhaps fatally. The parents of the boys are Poles, the fathers being employed in "children's greenhouses." THE DUST WOULD FLY. Joseph H.
