FELL FROM LADDER, BADLY BRUISED

Bank Clerk Fell Distance of 20 Feet and Miraculously Escapes Serious Injury

John Adam, son of James Adam of Stevenson street, and employed as a clerk in the First National Bank of Sayre, fell a distance of twenty feet from a ladder located on the third floor of the Valley House, and sustained bruises and contusions which will confine him in the hospital for a few days to come. The fact that he escaped with his life is regarded as a miracle. A part of Adam's duties at the bank consist of each morning displaying the government weather flags which are drawn to the top of a pole on the dome of the bank building by ropes. This morning about 11 o'clock he received the weather report and when he went to raise the proper flag found that the rope that is used to lower the flag which was displayed yesterday had been broken.

In order for him to repair the break he was compelled to go to the third floor of the Valley House and then go up a ladder through a skylight and thus reach the roof. When he had nearly reached the top of the ladder the latter slipped and Adam was precipitated to the floor beneath, where he landed at the head of a pair of stairs, striking on his hip. Before he could recover himself he went tumbling headlong down the flight of stairs and brought up at the bottom so badly jarred and bruised that it was necessary to send for the hospital ambulance. The hospital physicians say that he will be somewhat sore for a few days but will come out all right.

HAS FINE POSITION

C., warranted twenty years. The watch is a stem winder and set, wit neck chain attached. The chain has a small round slide set with a red stone.
