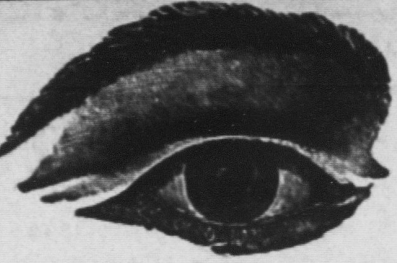

REUNITED BY AN ACCIDENT

New York Teacher Marries Man She Spurned Forty Years Ago—Story of the Remarkable Romance.

Kingston, N. Y.—After 40 years' separation Miss Margaret Cadwell and Irving Kinney, of Janesville, N. Y., met by accident in the village hotel at New Paltz the other night, and their marriage in this city 24 hours later completed their remarkable romance.

Senator Brackett Will Press Resolution Against Depeu. ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 11.—Senator Brackett's resolution requesting the resignation of United States Senator Chauncey M. Depeu was the only feature of the senate session here, although it was not introduced after all, and the expectation of another sensational attack upon and defense of Senator Depeu was disappointed.

The senate had run through its order of business in fifteen minutes and Senator Raines moved to adjourn. Senator Brackett declared that it was done to "choke off" his resolution. He accused Senator Raines of discourtesy in not advising him of his intention. "Speaking of discourtesy," said Senator Raines, "the senator might have told me he intended to introduce the resolution."

Senator Brackett said everybody knew he was going to introduce the resolution in accordance with his announcement when the resolution was before the senate last week. "No such announcement was made," interjected Senator Martin. "Oh, very well," said Senator Brackett. "Tomorrow will do as well. It was withdrawn that it would be presented at once, and hereafter, I suppose, I shall have to consult with my leader in the senate."

Senator Brackett said he would yet put the senate on record on his resolution. OIL FOR THE ISTHMUS. California Company Will Put Pipe Line Across Canal Zone. WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—Secretary Taft has recommended to the president that he sanction the issue of a revocable license to the Union Oil company of California to construct and maintain a pipe line across the canal zone. There were six applicants for such a right, but the company named is the only one which specified the price of the oil if used by the government and whose offer was otherwise sufficiently definite and reasonable.

It is, however, expressly provided that the license shall not be exclusive, so that other companies may hereafter compete for the business. For its part, the company undertakes to pay \$500 per month, to be applied to school purposes in the canal zone, and also to permit the government to draw upon its pipe line at any point for oil at 90 cents per barrel. Secretary Taft in his letter to the president explains that this is about equivalent for fuel purposes to Pocomantas coal at the present cost on the isthmus of \$4 per ton, so that the oil may be used for all power purposes if desired in the construction of the canal.

As only refined oil is at present carried over the Panama railroad, the secretary does not fear that the transportation of crude oil by pipe would injure the business of the railroad. The company undertakes to complete the line by Aug. 1 next.
