WILL GIVE BANQUET

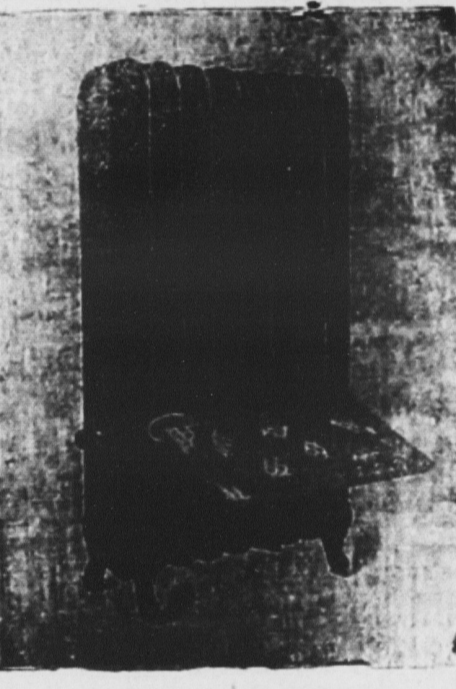
