INSTALLED NEW MACHINERY

Painton's Bakery on Broad street has been equipped with up to date machinery which is now being used to turn out the various kinds of bake stuffs.

The first machine is a 50-egg-capacity beater, which is used in making sponges and marshmallows. The mixer does away with hand mixing, the hopper of which makes 15 revolutions a minute.

The dough brake, consisting of two 10 inch steel rollers, does the work of kneading. The cookeymachine turns out 10,000 cookies in a day, and they are not touched once by the hands during the process of making.

The whole is driven by a 4-horse power electric motor. The bakery is open to visitors at any time.
