**ORINISH CLAIMS HE WAS ASSAULTED**

Declares That Man Who Owed Him Money Choked and Beat Him

Two or three weeks ago Wesley Solok, a young Hungarian who had been married but a short time, decided to go into the boarding house business. Solok negotiated with a man who ran a boarding house on the east side and finally decided to buy the man out. When he figured up his finances, however, Solok discovered that he was somewhat embarrassed so far as ready money was concerned, so he succeeded in inducing Mike Orinish another Hungarian, to lend him \$22.50 the amount required to buy the boarding house outfit. Yesterday was the day set for the return of the money, and as Solok failed to settle Orinish went to South Waverly and ordered a suit begun. A summons was placed in the hands of an officer and when it was served on Solok the latter settled the amount he owed Orinish and also paid the costs of the officer. A short time later Solok and Orinish met in a barroom. Orinish asked Solok for the money the latter owed him, and then the fur flew. Orinish alleges that Solok seized him by the neck and proceeded to punch him in the face and also to do other stunts that are not permitted by the laws of the state of Pennsylvania. Orinish made a complaint before a local justice and a warrant was issued for his assailant's arrest. This morning Chief Walsh went to Solok's residence and placed the man under arrest. He was paroled on his own recognizance until 4 o'clock this afternoon, when he will be given a hearing on the charge of assault.

**PRELIMINARY PLANS FOR NEW TOWN HALL**

Have Been Received by Committee Recently Appointed by the Borough Council

Chairman Chas. C. West of the committee recently appointed by the borough council to secure preliminary plans and estimates for a new town hall, has received from Pierce & Bickford a sketch for a three story building. The sketch is not at all elaborate, but it will be used as a starting point from which the committee will work. The profile shows a building which can be erected at a cost not exceeding \$16,000. The first floor provides room for three trucks, a council chamber, a justice's room and, on one side with a thick brick wall between, stables for a team of horses. On the second floor the space is arranged for quarters for two fire companies, billiard rooms, bath room, etc. The plans provide for a basement in which steel cages may be placed, and a tower in which to dry hose runs from the basement to a point a considerable distance above the mansard roof. The complete building as shown by the profile is a decidedly handsome structure and would be a credit to any town; but so far as the interior arrangement is concerned it is quite likely that the committee will recommend radical changes.

**OLD RELIABLE'S GOOD SHOWING**

Increased Earnings of \$1,564,000 at a Cost of Only \$90,000

The board of directors of the Erie railroad at a meeting held in New York yesterday authorized the double tracking of the line of that railroad from Carrollton to Cuba, N. Y., a distance of 25 miles, in connection with the new low grade line, 30 miles long on the Buffalo division. This will give the Erie a continuous double track from Salamanca, N. Y., to Jersey City, a distance of 414 miles.

The various fire companies will meet at the town hall tomorrow night for the purpose of electing officers for the ensuing year. A chief engineer and two assistants are to be elected. There will be names of four candidates for assistant on the ticket, but only two are to be elected.

**FIRST ANNUAL BALL**

The local Aerie of Eagles will hold a short business session at 8 o'clock this evening, after which the members will retire to Eighmey's hall and participate in the first annual ball. Dancing will begin at 9 o'clock and last until 12. A large number of invitations have been issued, and it is expected that there will be a big crowd in attendance.

**A SHOP EMPLOYEE SEVERELY INJURED**

Heavy Piece of Steel Struck Joseph Swyers a Tremendous Blow on the Thigh

While working in the Lehigh Valley railroad blacksmith shop at this place a little before noon today Joseph E. Swyers a resident of Athens, received a severe injury to his left thigh which will lay him up for some time. Swyers was engaged in cutting in two a bar of steel 22 feet long, 2 1/2 inches wide, and 7/8 of an inch thick. The bar was placed under a heavy steam hammer and when the ponderous hammer struck the bar it flew against Swyer's thigh with tremendous force. He was knocked to the floor of the shop and when his shopmates reached his side he was found to have suffered a severe and painful injury. Roy Tallada and Henry Taylor assisted Swyers to his home in Athens. The injured man was not able to touch his left foot to the ground and his companions were obliged to carry him to and from the trolley car. It is feared that one of the bones in his leg is broken.

**HIBBARD AT HOME**

Geo. R. Hibbard, the Owego man who disappeared a year ago, is now at the home of his brother-in-law in the former place. Hibbard will say nothing concerning his wanderings with the exception that for some time he was employed as a fireman in a greenhouse at Rochester. 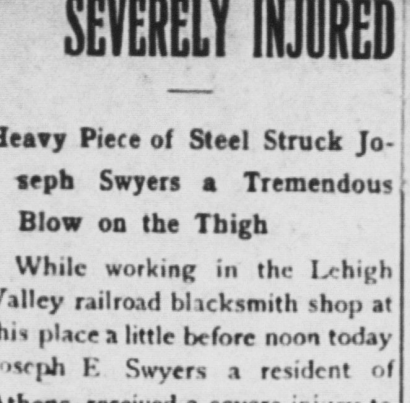
