JOHN D. CAMPBELL
Athens—John D. Campbell died at his home at 214 South street this morning at about 2 o'clock, after an illness of two months, aged 60 years. The cause of his death was pneumonia. Mr. Campbell was born in Calicoon, N. Y., and 38 years ago came to Athens with his parents. Two years later he was married to Miss Sylvia Osborne, who survives him. Two brothers, Wm. of Stevens' Point, N. Y., and Charles of Danville, and one sister, Mrs. John Stevens of Hancock, N. Y. Funeral will be private and interment will be made at Tioga Point cemetery. COURT SEALED PARKER'S LIPS.

Physician Not Allowed to Testify as to Burning of Wife's Yacht.
NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—Dr. Charles T. Parker was a witness in the suit of the London and Liverpool and Globe Insurance company against Mrs. Susan Day Parker for \$7,000 of the money paid to her for the loss of the steam yacht Scythian.

By a ruling of the court Dr. Parker was not permitted to deny or in any way refer to the sworn statement of Captain Thomas J. Cardiff, commander of the Scythian, that he had burned the yacht at the instance of Dr. Parker.

"Did you at any time offer to Captain Cardiff or promise him a sum of money if he burned the Scythian?" the witness was asked.

Mr. Cardoso, counsel for the insurance company, objected to the question on the ground that he had asked no question on Cardiff's direct examination which gave a basis for such a query. The lawyer said the accusation had been brought out in an effort to attack the credibility of Captain Cardiff and objected to the question as incompetent. He said it would not be competent unless Mrs. Parker, the defendant, had been charged with knowledge of the alleged arson.

The objection was finally sustained. Judge Wheeler remarked in commenting upon the ruling:

"I expect to tell the jury that the question as to whether or not Dr. Parker told Cardiff to burn the boat and promised him money for so doing has nothing to do with this case."

Hubert W. Nickerson, captain of a boat which he had bought from Mrs. Parker and mate on the Scythian when she was burned, was a witness.

He identified a letter he had written to Captain Cardiff. A passage was read to him, and he was asked to what he referred by a particular passage.

"Well," he said, "I might have referred to an offer made to me by Captain Cardiff to pay me \$4,000 to come here and corroborate his testimony."
