**TO IMPROVE SAYRE'S  
FIRE DEPARTMENT**

**A Joint Committee Meeting Was  
Held Last Evening for That  
Purpose**

A committee representing the Firemen's Relief association and a committee from the Sayre borough council met in joint session last evening to discuss matters pertaining to the fire department in this place. For a long time it has been generally conceded that the department needs a better fire alarm system, and the meeting last night was held for the purpose of arranging for a better service. As the matter now stands alarms are sent through the Valley telephone system. This manner of sending in alarms is said by the firemen to be highly unsatisfactory, as when the whistle blows the various telephone patrons get busy and keep the central exchange busy asking where the fire is located. Firemen who want to know as a matter of business are told that the line is busy, and in many cases if they want to find where the fire is they are compelled to get their information from other sources.

At the meeting last night the telephone company officials agreed to see that all hose houses were placed on private lines so that in the future the firemen will have no difficulty in learning of the exact location of a fire.

The present manner of blowing the fire whistle was also discussed and it was decided to ask for a change. As it now stands one long whistle indicates that there is a fire. Then the number of short blasts that follow tell the ward in which it is located. The long blast is said by the firemen to be deceptive, and has heretofore been mistaken for an ordinary whistle.

After a considerable discussion of the matter it was decided to ask the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company to change the alarm whistle in so far as the long blast is concerned. The company will be asked to blow a succession of short blasts for a period of one minute and then follow with the number of the ward.

It was also decided to offer a prize of fifty dollars to the company responding the greatest number of times at fires during the ensuing year. The borough council will be asked to increase the appropriation of each company from \$125 to \$150 per year. A number of other matters looking to the improvement of the department were also discussed, and the meeting adjourned.

**Four of the Twenty Men Who  
Are to Furnish Cuticle for  
Martin Galliger Made Good  
Yesterday**

John Hammond, Leroy Donlin, John Riley and Fred Shaffer, all employees of the Lehigh Valley, went to the Packer hospital yesterday afternoon and while there each man submitted to the removal of one square inch of skin from his arm. The four men are the first installment of the twenty Lehigh men who have consented to furnish twenty square inches of cuticle to cover a portion of Martin Galliger's body, which was badly burned in the boiler explosion at VanEttenville recently. The men underwent the operation of removing the skin without the aid of anesthetics and exhibited an excellent quality of nerve. In a week or ten days the second installment of volunteers will be called upon to go to the hospital to perform a similar service for their injured fellowworkman.

**TRAIN RIDERS  
COME TO GRIEF**

**One of Them Sustains Broken  
Nose in Jumping From Moving  
Train and Both Land in Jail**

Frank McCall and Frank Coughlin, two fairly dressed young men were placed under arrest here today by the Lehigh Valley company detectives, charged with train riding. McCall was suffering from a broken nose which he received at Towanda this forenoon. Both men are said to have boarded a freight train at Towanda. They jumped on the caboose and after the train was well under way, were discovered by the conductor who ordered them to get off. McCall jumped first and when his feet struck the ground, he stumbled and fell headlong, striking on his face, sustaining a fracture of the nasal bone and contusions. Coughlin was more fortunate and landed along side the tracks in safety. The railroad officials at Towanda were notified of the accident that had occurred to McCall and furnished him transportation to this place. Upon his arrival here he was taken to the hospital where his broken nose was given attention, after which he was placed under arrest and taken to the borough lockup.
