WILL LIE LOW.

Russian Revolutionaries to Postpone Further Hostilities Until March.

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 25.—An important conference of the revolutionary organizations has been concluded in Finland after several sessions lasting for two days. The conference decided to postpone all further revolutionary operations until March, when, it was hoped by the delegates, the agrarian troubles would recommence.

There were ninety delegates in the conference, representing the central committees of the Social Democratic revolutionists, the Peasant League, the Council of Workmen, the Polish Socialists and the Finnish revolutionists.

The collapse of the December uprising disheartened all except the Poles, who wished to make another attempt at the end of the month, but this desire was negated. All the parties were ordered to "lie low" until the peasant movement furnished a new opportunity. The delegates of the Peasant League promised to have armies of peasants knocking at the gates of the cities to join hands with their brothers within. It was decided that active operations would be continued only in the Baltic provinces.

The Finnish organizations were instructed with the securing of a new supply of arms to replace those captured by the government. These arms, it was planned, would be smuggled across the Finnish border.

AGED RESIDENT DEAD

Waverly—William H. Allen, one of Waverly's oldest citizens, died at his home on Broad street Saturday at the advanced age of 74 years. He was a man of sterling integrity and for years was one of the leading business men of the village. He was engaged in the wholesale oil business for a long time in co-partnership with the late Henry Shower.

He is survived by his wife and one son, Dr. William H. Allen of Montana, two sisters who reside in East Smithfield, Pa., a brother in Titusville and a brother in Coudersport, Pa.

Funeral services will be held at his late home at 7:30 o'clock this evening, and Rev. Alanson Tilden will officiate. The remains will be taken to East Smithfield tomorrow morning for burial. An escort from the local Masonic order will accompany the remains to that place.

Chinese Officials at Soldiers' Home. WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—With the exception of a visit to the Soldiers' home here and several official calls the Imperial Chinese commissioners visiting this country spent the day quietly, resting Brigadier General Hamilton S. Hawkins, the governor of the Soldiers' home, entertained the commissioners informally. The commissioners were accompanied by Sir Chenung Liang Cheng, the Chinese minister, and Chief Clerk Deuby of the state department.

Naval Training Station Burned. NEWPORT, R. I., Jan. 29.—Seven buildings connected with the United States naval training station at Coasters' Harbor island, in this city, were destroyed by fire last night, causing an estimated loss of \$100,000. The buildings destroyed were the detention building, machine shop, paint shop, paymaster's storehouse, carpenter shop and two small storehouses.
