HERO PRIEST DEAD.

Rev. Matthew O'Koofe Was Persons

Friend of Lee and Davis. TOWSON, Md., Jan. 29 .- Rev. Mat thew O'Keefe, pastor of the Roman Catholic Church of the Immaculate, is dead of pneumonia contracted while re sponding to calls to attend the sick He was seveny-eight years old and native of Waterford, Ireland.

The oldest priest in the diocese Father O'Keefe was the last surviving etc. brigade chaplain of the Confederate army, he having been chaplain of Mabone's brigade of the army of northern Virginia and a close personal friend of General Robert E. Lee and Jefferson Davis.

Father O'Keefe made himself famous throughout the south by his work during the outbreak of yellow fever at Norfolk and Portsmouth in 1855 and in 1869 won the red ribbon of the Legion of Honor by his attendance upon the officers and crew of a fever stricken French frigate that put in at Hampton Roads. He is said to have died practically penuliess, having devoted his large fortune to church works.

Town Trensurer a Suicide. CHESHIRE, Mass., Jan. 20. - Depondency and anxiety are believed to have been the cause of the suicide of Town Treasurer Fred C. Brown. He had been much depressed for several months over the death of his wife. and recently an investigation was made of his accounts, which showed them to be correct and the town funds ntact, although \$3,500 was in his iouse and the balance, a comparatively small amount, was in the bank at Adams. Mr. Brown was found dead at his bome here with bottles of morphine and chloroform by his side. Mr Brown was sixty years old and had been town treasurer for ten years.

Taps Have Sounded Over 28,006. WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.-10 the past six months taps have been sounded over the graves of 28,006 pensioners of the civil war, according to a statement of Pension Commissioner Warner. The total number of pensioners on July 1, 1905, was 684.608. On Dec 81 It was 679,284.


