REPUBLICAN PRIMARIES

The borough Republican primaries were held Saturday evening and were very largely attended. The strile was principally on burgess, council, school directors and tax collector. For burgess George A. Kinney was nominated by a majority of nearly forty. Tax Collector Bressler received 195 votes, McKean standing next with 154 votes. For school director in first ward Dr. E. B. Joachim won by a majority of 115 over Dr. D. McClarty, and M. W. Nevins was nominated for councilman by a majority of 75 over D. J. Macafee. Dr. C. L. Stevens was nominated for councilman in second ward by a majority of 56 over E. M. Crawford.

Athens--The Democratic caucus for Athens township was held Saturday and the following nominations were made: Justice of the peace, D. M. Brainerd; school directors, S. J. Morley, Wm. Limerick, B. S. Hadlock; collector, George W. Wheeler; supervisor, J. P. Leahey; treasurer, W. D. Weller; auditor, George Dailey; township trustee, N. F. Walker. The Republican caucus for Athens township will be held today.

Athens--All of the judges who officiated at the Republican primaries Saturday night will meet at the office of C. E. Mills tomorrow evening to complete the returns to send in to the county convention.

GENERAL WHEELER BURIED

Remains of Historic Veteran Officer Laid to Rest at Arlington. WASHINGTON, Jan. 29--President Roosevelt and many notable men attended the funeral of General Joseph Wheeler at St. John's Protestant Episcopal church in this city today. The president did not accompany the body to Arlington, but attended simply the church service, which was conducted by the Rev. Dr. Stiles of St. Thomas church, New York, who accompanied the funeral party to Washington and who also conducted the services at the grave.

The body lay in state at St. John's church until the services were concluded, when it was escorted to Arlington cemetery and buried there with military honors. The military escort consisted of a battalion of engineers from Washington barracks, representing the infantry branch of the service; a squadron of cavalry from Fort Myer and one of more batteries of artillery from Fort Myer. A place in line was reserved for the Confederate Veterans' association of Washington, the United Spanish War Veterans and the Army and Navy union.

M'GRAW VILLAGE ABLAZE

Nearly All of Main Street a Tree to Flames--Loss, \$40,000. BINGHAMTON, N. Y., Jan. 29--A fire in the little village of McGraw, four miles east of Cortland, destroyed twelve of the fifteen stores and shops on Main street, at a loss estimated at \$40,000.

The loss was much greater than it would have been had not the village been without adequate fire fighting apparatus. An old fashioned hand engine constituted the village equipment, and that was put out of commission at the start by one of the firemen dropping a wrench into the valve. The arrival of apparatus from Cortland was all that saved any of the village from destruction.

The fire started in the Palmer block under the stairs leading to the Citizens' club. The burned buildings included Goodell's hotel, G. T. Henry's meat market, H. L. Chapin's lunch room, the postoffice, H. D. Palmer's general store, Warren Green's pool room, L. D. Gross' market, H. C. Johnson's coal office, C. D. Fish's drug store, W. E. Miner's bakery, Mrs. J. E. Bowditch's millinery store and Dr. H. C. Hendrick's office and four barns.

HERO PRIEST DEAD

Rev. Matthew O'Keefe Was Personal Friend of Lee and Davis. TOWSON, Md., Jan. 29--Rev. Matthew O'Keefe, pastor of the Roman Catholic Church of the Immaculate, is dead of pneumonia contracted while responding to calls to attend the sick. He was seventy-eight years old and a native of Waterford, Ireland. The oldest priest in the diocese, Father O'Keefe was the last surviving brigade chaplain of the Confederate army, he having been chaplain of Mebane's brigade of the army of northern Virginia and a close personal friend of General Robert E. Lee and Jefferson Davis. Father O'Keefe made himself famous throughout the south by his work during the outbreak of yellow fever at Norfolk and Portsmouth in 1855 and in 1869 won the red ribbon of the Legion of Honor by his attendance upon the officers and crew of a fever stricken French frigate that put in at Hampton Roads. He is said to have died practically penniless, having devoted his large fortune to church works.

Town Treasurer a Suicide. CHESHIRE, Mass., Jan. 29--Depression and anxiety are believed to have been the cause of the suicide of Town Treasurer Fred C. Brown. He had been much depressed for several months over the death of his wife, and recently an investigation was made of his accounts, which showed them to be correct and the town funds intact, although \$8,500 was in his house and the balance, a comparatively small amount, was in the bank at Adams. Mr. Brown was found dead at his home here with bottles of morphine and chloroform by his side. Mr. Brown was sixty years old and had been town treasurer for ten years.

Taps Have Sounded Over 28,000. WASHINGTON, Jan. 29--In the past six months taps have been sounded over the graves of 28,000 pensioners of the civil war, according to a statement of Pension Commissioner Warner. The total number of pensioners on July 1, 1905, was 684,008. On Dec. 31 it was 679,234.
