**MRS. BAKER'S CASE
QUITE INTERESTING**

Returned to the County Which Fought Through the Courts to Be Relieved of Her Support

A few weeks ago a middle aged woman named Mrs. Lorina Baker, who has resided in Sayre about four months, made application for an order of relief. The relief order was granted by two local justices of the peace but when the county commissioners came here to make investigation it was discovered that there was a question as to her being a charge on the county of Bradford. She had been living with Charles Ross, her son in law, who declared that he was not able to maintain her and in addition to this statement he declared that his mother in law was a trifle demented. Now it appears that the woman has quite an interesting history so far as it relates to her experience in obtaining assistance from the poor authorities of this state. About twelve years ago she became a charge upon the county of Susquehanna, but the poor authorities of that county claimed that the woman's legal residence was in Wyoming county, and therefore the latter county should properly be charged with her support. The commissioners of Susquehanna county sued Wyoming county on this contention and the case was carried to the supreme court of the state, resulting in Susquehanna county being defeated. Nothing more was heard of the woman, so far as relief orders were concerned, until her appearance in Sayre. Commissioner McNulty discovered that there was some doubt as to her legal residence here and he decided to look the matter up, with the result that he found that Wyoming county was chargeable with her support. Accordingly he notified the authorities of that county and yesterday Chief of Police Charles Vaughn came here and took Mrs. Baker to Tunkhannock, thereby returning her to the county which contended in the various courts that the woman's support was chargeable to Susquehanna county.

**LOOKING FOR SHIRT
MANUFACTURING SITE**

Parties Here Today Who May Locate a Plant in Sayre

Jacob Gerhardt, a shirt manufacturer of Hazelton, is in Sayre today looking over the place as a possible site for a manufacturing plant. Mr. Gerhardt is interested in a plant at Hazelton which employs 600 operatives. It is desired to increase the output, and Sayre has been recommended as an excellent place in which to locate. When seen by a Record representative this morning Mr. Gerhardt had not had opportunity to look the town over, and therefore was in no position to say whether it would meet the requirements, but a meeting of the business men's association will be held this evening for the purpose of considering the matter.

In the meantime The Record can assure Mr. Gerhardt or others interested in having a shirt manufacturing plant located here that Sayre offers unexcelled inducements. The shipping facilities here are first class, there would be little difficulty in securing the necessary help and its citizens will give the enterprise all encouragement possible.

**THE WEATHER WILL
UNDERGO A CHANGE**

Local Forecaster Says There Will Be a Decided Drop in the Temperature Inside 12 Hours

A decided change in the temperature may be expected within 12 hours. A cold wave is scheduled to land in Sayre tomorrow morning and before tomorrow night the mercury will have fallen at least 40 degrees from its present place in the bulb. This is not a government weather bureau prediction but is the prognostication of a local weather observer, who bases his belief on the fact that the moon will change tomorrow morning at about 7:30 o'clock. He says that he has always noticed that at this time of the year when the moon changes in the morning there is always a drop in the temperature. So tonight it will be a good plan to see that the furnace fires are well looked after and that the cellar windows are closed.

CREDITORS CAUSE TROUBLE

Frank Gill, who has been residing on North Lehigh avenue for some time, was caused considerable trouble here yesterday afternoon by his creditors. Gill, it is claimed, was loading his household goods on the cars when Officer B. L. Lewis appeared armed with several fraudulent debtors' attachments. The officials of the Lehigh thereupon objected to the goods being loaded on the cars and the drayman and the officer did not know what to do with them. Finally the officer instructed the drayman to take care of the goods, and in the meantime Gill has been busy trying to effect a settlement.

This afternoon Gill was arrested on the complaint of F. E. Seager. The latter alleged that Gill had secured groceries and provisions under false pretense. When The Record went to press Gill was still in custody.

RAILROADERS SCARCE

There is a remarkable scarcity of railroad men in the mining regions. It is almost impossible to get men for the coal train service this winter, whereas last winter there were plenty of men. The reason for the scarcity of railroaders is that the men prefer working in the mines, as the pay in most cases is better and the hours are shorter. So far as the danger is concerned however, there is little choice.

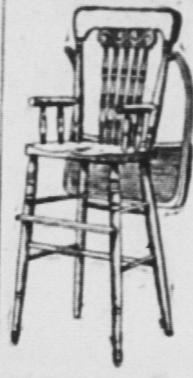
