soldier Who Served Country Monorably Refused Admittance.

BOSTON, Jan. 31.-Although he has served three enlistments under the flag of the United States, once in the regular army, once in the navy and once as a volunteer, from each of which he received an honorable discharge, John J. Bowes will be refused admittance to the United States unless the immigration authorities receive assurances that he will not become a public

Bowes is a native of Great Britain, and despite his military service here he has never been naturalized.

He arrived at this port Jan. 19 and was detained on the ground that he might become a public charge. He was suffering from rheumatism and a bullet wound received while serving in the Philippines which has never properly healed. The immigration officials here and at Washington are endeavoring to have Bowes admitted to a soldlers' home
