IN THE SENATE.

Forty Bills, Many Important, Passed by Congress.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.--The senate passed about forty bills, many of them of considerable importance. The list included a number of measures for lighthouses, fog signals, revenue cutter vessels and public buildings and also the bill providing for the reorganization of the consular service.

It provides for the classification of consular officers in grades, gives the president authority to transfer officers from one station to another, provides an inspection service with five inspectors who are to rank as consuls general, requires that clerks at consulates shall be Americans, prohibits consuls from engaging in law business and requires that all consular fees shall be accounted for.

HIS REWARD.

Soldier Who Served Country Honorably Refused Admittance. BOSTON, Jan. 31.--Although he has served three enlistments under the flag of the United States, once in the regular army, once in the navy and once as a volunteer, from each of which he received an honorable discharge, John J. Bowes will be refused admittance to the United States unless the immigration authorities receive assurances that he will not become a public charge.

Bowes is a native of Great Britain, and despite his military service here he has never been naturalized. He arrived at this port Jan. 19 and was detained on the ground that he might become a public charge. He was suffering from rheumatism and a bullet wound received while serving in the Philippines which has never properly healed.

The officials here say that Bowes is not eligible for admission to this country and will have to be deported unless some one guarantees to care for him. It is thought, however, that the man will be received by a soldiers' or sailors' home.

UP THE LINER'S SIDE.

Miss Roosevelt and Her Intended Meet Countess de Chantonnay. NEW YORK, Jan. 31.--Miss Alice Roosevelt and her fiancé, Congressman Nicholas Longworth, boarded a revenue cutter here, proceeded down New York harbor and met the steamer Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse, upon which Countess de Chantonnay, Mr. Longworth's sister, was a passenger.

The countess, who was formerly Miss Clara Longworth of Cincinnati, has come to this country as a guest at Miss Roosevelt's wedding. At quarantine station, where the Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse slowed down, the revenue cutter went alongside the big liner. An attempt was made to lower a companion ladder for Miss Roosevelt, but the delay in doing this was too great, and Miss Roosevelt boarded the steamer by the pilot ladder and so greeted her future sister-in-law and gave her a warm welcome to America.
