MRS. YERKES WEDS WESTERNER.

Widow of Multimillionaire Who Died a Month Ago Marries Again. NEW YORK, Feb. 1.--Mrs. Charles T. Yerkes, the widow of the financier who died a month ago leaving her \$7,500,000, was married to Wilson Mizner of San Francisco.

Mrs. Mizner is about fifty years of age. Her new husband is twenty-nine. The marriage took place shortly after 8 o'clock in the evening in the Yerkes mansion, 804 Fifth Avenue, which in time is to become the property of the city, with its art treasures and be known as the "Yerkes Art galleries."

The witnesses to the marriage were two friends of Mizner, J. L. Eastland and Emile Brugger of San Francisco, and a woman companion of Mrs. Yerkes, Mrs. Goodall.

Mr. Eastland, who was seen in his room at the Hotel Seymour, said: "Yes, Mrs. Yerkes and my friend Mizner are married. I was a witness to the ceremony."

A short time after the death of Mr. Yerkes, which took place at the Waldorf-Astoria a few days before Christmas, Mrs. Yerkes denied the report that she and Mr. Mizner were engaged, but when Mrs. Yerkes went to Chicago Mr. Mizner followed, and peculiarly enough, just about the time that she returned to this city Mr. Mizner came too.

Wilson Mizner is one of five brothers, the sons of the former minister to Mexico and Guatemala. The members of his family are prominent socially in San Francisco, moving in the most exclusive circles.

Mizner's brother said that after the death of Mr. Yerkes they decided to get married, but at first thought that they would wait at least a year.

It is not their intention to leave New York, except for a short trip perhaps. They will remain here until the estate is settled.

Mizner was one of the first men in the Klondyke, where he spent four years and accumulated money. He has considerable reputation as a wit and a raconteur and is a member of the Bohemian club of San Francisco, a unique organization famous for its novel entertainments.
