**ITHACA MAN FELL
DOWN BACK STAIRS**

Timothy Donahue Opened the Wrong Door and Took a Serious Tumble

Timothy Donahue, a man well along in years, and a resident of Ithaca, was taken to the hospital yesterday afternoon suffering from a slight concussion of the brain and a scalp wound in the back of the head the result of falling down the back stairs at the Wilbur house.

Mr. Donahue is a brother in law to Timothy Dacey, whose death occurred here on Wednesday evening, and he had come to Sayre to assist in making preparations for the removal of the remains to New York city. He registered at the Wilbur house and was assigned a room. He went to the room and it is presumed a short time later he attempted to find the toilet room. He opened a door, however, at the head of the back stairs which are used by the servants at the hotel, and with nothing to warn him of his mistake, plunged headlong down the stairs, a distance of nearly fifteen feet. The occupants of the hotel office heard the noise and ran to investigate. James Forah, one of the clerks, rushed to the foot of the stairs and found Mr. Donahue lying on the ground, in an unconscious condition and bleeding from a hole in the head. It was at first thought that the man had been seriously injured, but after having been taken to the hospital it developed that he was suffering from a slight concussion, and the doctors think that he will recover in a few days.

LEHIGH'S NEW BRIDGE

The Lehigh's new steel bridge at Tunkhannock, which has been in the course of construction since August last, is practically completed, and the work of removing the timbers and false work will probably be completed the fore part of the coming week. The foundations were begun in August and the work of placing the steel was commenced in November. There have been on an average of twenty-five men employed, and the structure is said to have cost in the neighborhood of \$85,000. The bridge, which crosses the Tunkhannock creek, is one of the finest in this section of the state.

CHANGE IN PLACE

So much interest has developed in the musicale arranged by Mrs. C. M. Driggs originally for her home on Feb. 7, that the King's Daughters of the Presbyterian church, under whose auspices the concert will be given, have decided to hold it in the church, that there may be accommodations for every one and a better opportunity to hear the music. Besides the local musicians who will play and sing, Rev. J. W. Bisschoff of Tunkhannock, on the 'cello and Mr. Phillip Warren, solo baritone of the Elm Park church, Scranton, have offered their services for the occasion.

ADDRESS ON SOCIALISM

Joseph Wanhope, one of the best lecturers engaged in the socialistic propaganda, will speak at the Howard Elmer hose house in West Sayre tomorrow evening. No admission will be charged and everybody is invited. Mr. Wanhope advocates the public ownership of the wealth producing industries and this lecture will give people a chance to learn about a movement that is attracting much attention but which is not generally understood.

FINGER SEVERED

Claude Benjamin, an employe of the stamping works, met with an accident yesterday which cost him the index finger of the right hand. The finger was caught under a hammer and was smashed so badly that amputation was necessary.

**REPUBLICANS MET
IN CONVENTION**

Harmonious Gathering of Republican Hosts at Towanda Yesterday Afternoon

The representatives of the Republican party in Bradford county met in convention at Towanda yesterday, and after a session lasting one hour and twenty five minutes endorsed Hon. Mial E. Lilley of Towanda for congressman from this district and elected ex-Sheriff Robinson of Athens, county chairman to succeed Roy J. Lilley, who tendered his resignation. Four delegates to the state convention and four alternates were elected, and a resolution was passed that at a later date if twenty members of the county committee saw fit a call for primaries shall be issued to instruct these delegates for state officers.

There were 148 delegates in attendance and it was 'one of the largest conventions in point of attendance that has been held by the Republicans in years. Hon. W. T. Davies, ex-lieutenant governor of the state of Pennsylvania, and a pioneer Republican of Bradford county, was unanimously chosen chairman. John K. Stewart of Towanda and L. A. Wolcott of Wyndham were elected secretaries, and the chair appointed Mr. Piollet and Grant Holcomb of Ulster, C. L. Wolfe of Sayre, L. D. May of Granville and Wm Sweet of Troy as a committee on resolutions. Attorney C. C. Yocum of this place offered a resolution endorsing Hon. Mial E. Lilley for congress and authorizing that gentlemen to select the conferees to represent Bradford county in the next Republican Congressional convention to nominate a candidate for congress from the fourteenth district of Pennsylvania. Following the introduction and adoption of this resolution Mr. Lilley addressed the convention, and spoke of the work now being done by congress, and complimented the Republican majority in that body for its untiring efforts in behalf of the people. He stamped President Theodore Roosevelt as the greatest man to occupy the Presidential chair since the days of the lamented Lincoln. At the conclusion of his speech Mr. Lilley offered the resolution providing for the calling of primaries, if it were deemed necessary. There was some show of opposition to the resolution but it was finally carried.

EXPRESS MORE HOPE

The ice men are more hopeful today than they have been before this winter. The thermometer early this morning stood 3 below zero, and in addition to this the groundhog saw his shadow. According to the ancient belief we are now to have six weeks of cold weather, and in the meantime it is expected that the long delayed ice formation will materialize.

Athens—Dr. D. McClarty received a telegram this forenoon stating that both his father and mother, Roberty McClarty and Mary J. McClarty, died at their home in Salem, N. Y., this morning. The doctor started for Salem on the late train this afternoon. We sympathize very deeply with the doctor in his double affliction.

WILL PRESENT PLAY

The officers and members of the degree team of the N. P. L. will present the "The Old Maid's Convention" at the local lodge rooms this evening. There will doubtless be a large crowd in attendance and the entertainment promises to be a fine one. There will also be about \$1,000 paid out in dividends to members of the order.

**SKIN GRAFTING
PROCESS COMPLETED**

Martin Galligers Burns Have Been Covered With Cuticle and Surgeons Look for Success

The twenty square inches of burned surface on Martin Galliger's body has been covered with skin grafts and if the grafts all "take" it is expected that he will recover quickly.

Galliger was horribly burned about the neck and shoulders and the skin grafting process was the only method by which the wounds could be healed. His wife furnished a large amount of cuticle with which to cover the burns, but as soon as it became known to the fellow railroad employes of Galliger, twenty of them volunteered to furnish one square inch of skin each. The last six of the men went to the hospital yesterday afternoon. They were F. Marion Pierce, Harry Crans, Clarence Dixon, Patrick McDonald, Mike Gorman and Fred Fahey. The men are all employed by the Lehigh and volunteered their services. The surgeons at the hospital are hopeful that the process will be a success and that Galliger will be able to leave the institution in a short time.

DIED THIS MORNING

Mrs. Elizabeth M. Stevens, 71 years of age, died this morning at 7:30 o'clock at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Leonard S. Irvine, of No. 325 Chemung street. Death was due to liver trouble. She was a widow and had been a resident of Sayre for thirteen years. She is survived by her daughter, Mrs. Irvine. The arrangements for the funeral are not yet completed.

BODY CUT IN TWO

William Ressler, a car inspector employed by the Lehigh Valley at Copley, was killed at that place on Wednesday night. Ressler tried to board the caboose of a coal train to go to Copley. He made a grab for the handles attached to the forward end of the caboose, missed his grasp and fell beneath the wheels. The wheels cut his body completely in two. The deceased was 25 years old and had worked for the Lehigh for three years. He resided at Tamaqua.
