MINERS ARE FOR A STRIKE.

Conference Has Refused Wage Scale Offered by Operators.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Feb. 2--At the joint conference of central district miners and operators here the report of the scale committee announcing a disagreement was read and was made of record. President Mitchell then asked the operators if they had any other proposition to make.

Later W. D. Ryan, chairman of the joint conference of the central district and secretary of the Illinois miners, reported to the miners in convention the situation and moved to refuse the proposition of the operators. He urged that no agreement be signed by any district unless an agreement was signed in all the districts.

Secretary Wilson said, "According to my understanding the adoption of this motion means a strike--an industrial war." Mr. Wilson said that the finances of the national organization were not at present in a condition to take care of the entire membership in a long strike, and he moved an assent, meant per capita of \$1 per week. Both sides replied for the operators that they had not.

After the motion of Mr. Wilson had been amended to provide that the districts should take care of their dependents for ten weeks instead of six the matter was referred to the national executive board with power to act. Immediately following the rejection of the operators' proposal the miners' convention set about providing for a strike fund of \$5,000,000, in addition to a like amount now on deposit in international, district and sub-district treasuries of the miners' organizations.

Soldier's Body Found in Trunk.

NORFOLK, Va., Feb. 2--The murdered body of Walter P. Dolson, twenty-six years old, who was discharged from the United States marine corps here on Saturday last after an honorable service of five years, was found packed in a trunk which had been purchased by the alleged murderer following the commission of the crime and into which it was intended to pack the murdered man's clothing and ship the whole away from Norfolk before the murder could be discovered. Charles F. Taylor, twenty-three years old, with whom Dolson had been rooming at a Norfolk lodging house, where the murder occurred, has fled. The police are now bending every energy to capture him. Robbery is the supposed motive.

Insurance Convention at Chicago.

CHICAGO, Feb. 2--Discussion of deferred dividend life insurance policies and organization occupied the time at the session of the national insurance convention, called by Insurance Commissioner Thomas E. Drake of the District of Columbia, with the approval of President Roosevelt. No action of a decisive nature was taken, all questions of policy being referred to a committee, which will report later.
