REPUBLICANS FORM A PERMANENT CLUB

Held Well Attended and Enthusiastic Meeting Last Night and Discussed Many Matters in Connection with Coming Municipal Election

An enthusiastic and well attended meeting of representative Republicans of Sayre borough was held last night in the office of Wm. Cross, candidate for burgess on the Republican ticket, and before adjournment there was perfected a permanent organization which promises big things for the future and which will be a credit to the banner town of the valley.

The gathering was in session for over two hours, during which time many important matters bearing on the coming municipal election were presented and discussed, and after plans had matured for the campaign, a permanent organization was effected.

S. A. Blish was chosen president of the club and George Bonfoey was elected secretary. Various committees to represent the four wards in the borough were appointed, and plans looking to the success of the borough ticket were also formulated.

The meeting was a most harmonious one, and it was agreed that the ticket nominated at the primaries held on Saturday evening last was an excellent one in every respect. It developed, however, that in one or two instances Mr. Cross had been the subject of adverse criticism on account of his being, what has been termed by some, a new comer. Considerable discussion followed this statement, during which the following facts regarding Mr. Cross' standing in the borough of Sayre came to the surface: He has been a resident of this place for a period of three years, during which time he has built up a business standing which is not only a credit to himself, but which is of inestimable value to the residents of the town. He is a property owner on Keystone avenue and is at the head of the well known Modern Protective Association, an insurance order which each month brings into Sayre between \$15,000 and \$20,000. The enterprise mentioned employs a liberal amount of labor, and it is a well known fact that the price paid therefor is higher than that which is paid for similar service in Sayre.

In addition to this, each month a large volume of printed matter, the work on which is done in Sayre, is sent to all parts of the United States, resulting in this place being advertised extensively abroad. Speaking for himself, Mr. Cross stated that his interests were all centered on Sayre and its welfare, and that if elected to the office of burgess he would see that the rights of the borough were protected and that its citizens were given a square deal. He stoutly asserted that he wore no man's collar, and that if the people saw fit to make him chief executive of this place that he would go into office bound by no promises, and free to administer municipal affairs without fear or favor.

RIVER FROZEN OVER

The mercury touched the zero mark again this morning. The ice men are more hopeful. A thin sheet of ice covered the Susquehanna this morning and the dealers say that if the cold weather continues for two or three days longer the harvest will begin. The predictions are for continued cold.

COUNTY AUDITORS FINISH THEIR WORK

Total of \$208,289.98 Expended for County and Poor District

The County Auditors, Alden Keyes, of Sylvania, Wilbur Gorham, of Orwell, and George E. Lull, of Sayre, have completed the county audit, after having been in session almost continuously since the first of January. The report has been filed at the office of the county prothonotary, and it will be published in three of the county papers for four consecutive weeks. The report, which is directed to the Hon. A. C. Fanning, shows a complete summary of the expenditures of the various departments of the county government, the receipts from taxation, and also a statement of the indebtedness and assets of the county, the poor district and the court house funds.

The indebtedness of Bradford county is \$45,098.09; the indebtedness of the Bradford county poor district is \$17,237.06. In the court house fund there is a balance of \$62,829.86 toward paying off the \$100,000 bonded indebtedness. The annual statement of the county commissioners of the receipts and expenditures of Bradford county and the Bradford county poor district is appended to the report. The total expenditures of the county and the poor district amounted in 1905 to a total of \$208,289.98.
