ONE IN CHRIST.

Essential Unity of Christians Finds Expression in Federation of Churches in America.

The inter-church conference on fed eration held in New York in November has made the Christian churches of the land realize as never before their real oneness of aim and destiny. As President Alfred T. Perry, of Marietta college, has said:

"All Christians are one in Christ. This is not merely a doctrine of faith, it is a fact of life; if in Christ, then of necessity members one of another. By virtue of the union to the one Lord, through the one faith, as declared in the one baptism, all Christians are brethren of the same family, fellow members of the body of Christ. This unity may be depled; it cannot be destroyed. The brother in the flesh may be disowned and cast out, but his relation as brother cannot thereby be annihilated; he is a brother still. The same is true of this spiritual brotherhood. Christian unity is then not an ideal to be striven for, but a fact to be manifested. The relation exists; it should be given proper expression; it must be confessed before men,"
