COSTS DIVIDED IN FRAUD CASE

Jury Says not Guilty in Vandermark Case and Divides the Costs.

The case of the Commonwealth versus Jerry Vandermark, who was charged with defrauding a boarding house keeper, was tried before Judge Fanning and a jury at Towanda yesterday. J. C. Osborn, who conducts a boarding house on North Lehigh avenue, was the prosecutor, and he claimed that Vandermark departed from his place without cause, leaving an unpaid board bill amounting to \$35. After listening to the evidence the jury returned a verdict of not guilty of attempting to defraud and placed half of the costs on the defendant and the other half on the prosecutor. Osborn settled his share of the costs but Vandermark was remanded to jail for thirty days, which time he will be compelled to serve unless he succeeds in liquidating the bill of costs.

AFRAID COURT WOULD DISCHARGE HIM

Charley Vanderpool Preferred a Jail Sentence Rather than Be Turned Out in the Cruel Cold World.

At Towanda yesterday Charles Vanderpool, a member of Towanda's notorious tribe, was on trial for stealing pork and potatoes. Charley had been in jail for some time and had friends who wanted him released. Accordingly they secured the services of a well known Sayre attorney who attended court yesterday. The attorney called on his client, but after he had questioned him a little the disciple of Blackstone advised him to plead guilty, as the case against him was decidedly strong. Charley, however, objected to this proceeding, and said he feared that if he pleaded guilty the judge would suspend sentence on him and turn him out in the cold, cold world; whereas, if he had a trial and was regularly convicted he would at least get a sentence of six months. By that time the birds would be singing and the atmosphere would be more conducive to living an outdoor life. After much persuasion the attorney decided to go to trial. The case was of short duration, and, as was expected, the jury brought in a verdict of guilty. But, much to the displeasure of the pork and potato thief, the court pronounced sentence of twenty days shoveling snow and performing similar manual labor out doors. The last seen of Charley by his attorney he was clearing away the snow on the court house steps.

ECLIPSE OF THE MOON

There will be an eclipse of the moon on Friday morning next which will be visible in all parts of the United States. The eclipse will occur at one o'clock in the morning, considerably earlier than many people are accustomed to rising and at about the hour that certain ones are in the habit of retiring. The moon will enter the earth's shadow and the eclipse will begin at exactly three minutes to one, eastern standard time. It will become total at two minutes before 2 o'clock and remain total for one hour and thirty-eight minutes, at the end of which the moon will begin to emerge from the shadow. The eclipse will end at 4:37 o'clock.
