BOROUGH COUNCIL

MET LAST NIGHT

Large Volume of Business Transacted and Many Matters Discussed

Athens—The adjourned monthly meeting of the borough council was held last evening, Councilmen Weller, Sutton, Weiss, Macafee and Tripp being present. After reading the minutes of the preceding meeting a number of bills were presented and ordered paid. John Jackson, who has performed the duties of Harry Morgan, as janitor of Union Hose company's rooms, presented his bill, which after discussion, was reduced to \$5 and ordered paid. Councilman Weiss, on the light committee, reported that the light on Mile Hill has been changed to all night service, and the light at the intersection of Desmond and Frederiek streets, has been installed. Chief Mulligan stated that he had conversed with the official of the Bell Telephone company in regard to having one of their instruments placed in city hall for free service, and they had stated that they paid for what they got and expected other people to do the same. On motion of Tripp the borough secretary was authorized to correspond with the company in regard to placing the 'phone in the hall and to say that if it could not be free that it was not wanted.

Ex-Chief Vandervelde appeared in the interest of No. 3 Hose company and stated that they were at considerable expense to furnish the new rooms and asked that the appropriation for the year 1906 be paid to them now so that they might pay bills that were necessary to be paid at once. On motion the request was granted.

Chief Engineer Willard Spalding made a report of the fire department supplies on hand and asked for 500 feet additional hose. This matter was considered as more properly belonging to the incoming new council and will be referred to them.

S. R. Matteson asked instructions as to who the combination to the locks on No. 3 hose house should be given, but no decision was given.

Councilman Weiss mentioned that the unpleasant odor from the gas company's works had not been abated, although the officers of the company have reported that their new machine has been installed and was in operation. Mr. Tripp stated that he and Mr. Mulligan had been to the gas works and had inspected the working of the machine and they were satisfied that it would do the work intended after it has been used a short time. On motion adjourned to meet on the afternoon of March 5 at 2 o'clock in order to close up the business of the year.
