IS FAMILIAR WITH VERACITY.

Mark Twain Has Entirely New Version of Cherry Tree Story.

NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—Mark Twain was at the second annual dinner and entertainment given by the Dickens Fellowship at the Press club in memory of Charles Dickens and spoke on "Veracity."

"John D. Rockefeller, Jr., told his Sunday school class a few weeks ago," said Mark Twain, "all about veracity and why it was better that everybody should always keep a plentiful supply on hand, and I want to say to you that among the hundreds of letters I receive each week many of them have suggested that I ought to attend Mr. Rockefeller's class."

"The point is not necessarily in the truthfulness of the small boy in a dirt-frog using the hotbed, but in the remarkable sagacity of a seven-year-old boy under trying circumstances," said he.

CRUSHED, NOT CURSED.

Wallace in Justice to Secretary Taft Corrects a Word.

NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—John F. Wallace, former chief engineer of the Panama canal, last night gave out the following statement:

"In justice to Secretary Taft and myself I desire to correct an erroneous report which has been given forth by the press of my examination before the senatorial committee in Washington on Tuesday."

"When the published press report was brought to my attention I was absolutely at a loss to determine in what way its misunderstanding occurred until my secretary, who afterwards examined the official record, informed me as to how the errors had evidently occurred upon the part of the press reporters."
