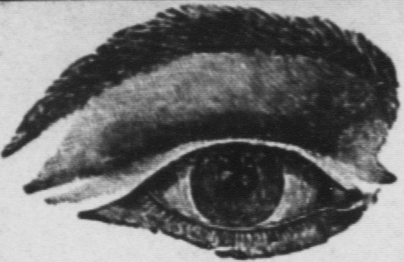

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KILLED IN THE YARDS THIS AFTERNOON

William G. Miller Struck by Train Four and Receive Fatal Injuries

William G. Miller, a laborer, who resides near the cove, was instantly killed this afternoon between 2 and 3 o'clock in the upper Lehigh Valley yards a few feet beyond the Hall signal tower. Miller was walking east on the eastbound track and evidently did not hear the approach of Lehigh passenger train No. 4 which came up behind him running late. The pilot of the engine struck him in the left side of his head and his body was thrown several feet from the track. The engineer of the train did not notice Miller until just an instant previous to the pilot of the engine striking him. The train was stopped and the trainmen placed the man's body on board and brought it to the local station. Later it was taken to Grumme's undertaking rooms where it was identified. Miller was about 30 years old and married but had no children. He had been employed by the Lehigh for some time as a laborer.
